State Gov invests in need to tackle climate change

THE PALASZCZUK Government's \$12 million QCoast2100 program is helping the Sunshine Coast get prepared for the impacts of climate change, including rising sea levels, storm tides and erosion.

During a recent trip to the region Minister for Environment Leeanne Enoch said Sunshine Coast Regional Council was receiving \$500,000 as part of the program to help develop a Coastal Hazard Adaptation Strategy.

"Under the Palaszczuk Government's QCoast2100 program, we are providing funding to councils to help identify risks and examine management options in communities threatened by climate change.

"The science is clear - we need to tackle climate change. "And this program is helping to

make our communities resilient to a changing climate. "The Council will use the

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

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Quota celebrate Women's Day | Strong start for Peregian Digital Hub

THE PEREGIAN Digital Hub is on track in its role of growing Noosa's digital sector and developing young tech talent, says Noosa Mayor Tony Wellington.

In the seven months since doors opened, the Hub has delivered an ambitious suite of programs, events and activities to support the region's digital entrepreneurs.

The Hub's talent development programs are among the biggest successes so far, the Mayor

"For example, the Hub has welcomed six interns and work experience students, aged 15 to 18, putting each of them in touch with a wealth of digital experts, including the Hub's anchor tenants.

"The Rufous Street facility recently hosted 18 female STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) students from local high schools for a Q and A session with four of the Sunshine Coast's leading female STEM practitioners.

"Each of the students' schools have since applied for Engaging Science grants to fund ongoing Girls in STEM programs," the Mayor said.

"20 students from eight schools recently learnt about drone technology in a five-week flying inventor program, delivered in a partnership with Noosa Library Service."

The Hub has developed more than 20 partnerships with local schools, universities, businesses and industry groups to mentor the young and support Noosa's tech community.

Queensland's former chief entrepreneur and Shark Tank star Steve Baxter is among the tech heavyweights the hub has brought to town to mentor locals.

"Last year the Hub hosted GovHack and that event led to the development of transport technology which we used in our Go Noosa transport trials," Mayor Wellington said.

"This provided real-time information to let drivers know where to park in Noosa Heads during the busy holiday period."

"We're very lucky to have Chris Boden in the director's chair and he brings a wealth of talent, with years of experience in global tech roles, including head of Lonely Planet's Mobile Division and Innovation Lab," Mayor Wellington said.

Mr Boden said the year ahead would be an important one for the Hub and it will offer new types of memberships and work on tackling local tech sector challenges.

"While Noosa has an impressive number of digital freelancers, consultants and agencies, there is more to be done to attract and support the kind of high-growth start-ups that will generate high-value jobs of the future," Mr Boden

"A major thrust for the Hub in 2019 is to work with digital industry partners to get Noosa's digital ecosystem more organised, making it easier for people to connect and collaborate with industry peers, find service providers, get work experience and find jobs," Mr Boden said.

The Hub now hosts a vibrant schedule of monthly events for digital industry groups, including Coding from the Beach (developers), REBOOT (digital agencies), Music Producer Group (DJs & electronic music producers) and the Sunshine Coast Screen Collective (digital storytellers).

Peregian Beach group endorses new Noosa Plan

PEREGIAN BEACH and Marcus Beach residents will welcome the New Noosa Plan and in particular its recognition of the unique and distinctive characteristics of their beachside communities it has been noted at a special meeting held recently between the residents and Noosa Council.

Noosa Council Deputy Mayor, Frank Wilkie, addressed the Peregian Beach Community Association (PBCA) at a meeting held last week and said that the New Noosa Plan recognises that Noosa Shire is a community of communities - consisting of several discrete places, each with their own unique and special identity.

Barry Cotterell, President of PBCA said that the New Noosa Plan recognises the distinct character and identity of our coastal communities and that development within each community is consistent with the defined identity of that community and that the local community supports the place-based approach to planning.

"Local residents are very protective of our unique character and identity and have fought long and hard to maintain the distinct character of our village and beachside communities", Mr Cotterell said.

"The last thing residents want is to be sub-

sumed into other areas".

"The place-based approach to planning will ensure the unique characteristics of our communities are preserved".

"Local residents are encouraged to read the Coastal Communities Local Plan Code (section 7.2.6) for the detail concerning the planning approach for both Marcus Beach and Peregian Beach," Mr Cotterell said.

Marcus Beach residents will welcome the commitment that there should be no commercial or retail development in the locality, and under the plan housing is predominantly for permanent residents and the locality's low density beachside character is to be maintained and accentuated.

Development in Peregian Beach maintains the informal village-like atmosphere featuring the low-key, attractive village square that distinguishes Peregian Beach from other centres in the local plan area and wider region.

"We are pleased that any development or redevelopment will maintain the existing strong sense of place," Mr Cotterell said.



Transport and Main Roads Director-General Neil Scales said Operation Safe Vehicle - Holiday aimed to keep Queensland road users safe during a busy time on the roads.

assessment of coastal hazards and identify assets at risk, as well as examining management options to keep the community safe," Minister Enoch said. "Engaging with and educating the community will also be an important part of the project to ensure people have a role in shaping the response to this significant issue."

Sunshine Coast Regional Council joins 31 other coastal councils in Queensland, covering all major 'at risk' urban centres along the coast.

Mayor Mark Jamieson said council was developing the CHAS so it better understood how future climate change and coastal hazards might affect the

"We appreciate the support of the Queensland Government to help us prepare for the possible impacts of climate change something that our council takes very seriously," Mayor Jamieson said.

"We need to learn more about what could be some of the potential impacts on our coastal areas and waterways, and identify practical solutions for our region, and it provides an opportunity for council and our broader community to positively and proactively work together."

"The CHAS will examine what may be the potential impacts of climate change, between now and 2100, and we'll be able to identify areas likely to be exposed to current and future coastal hazards. This work will help council and our residents understand the risks and most importantly we'll be able to adapt, to prepare for change and become more resilient over time," Mayor Jamieson said. Council's Environment and Liveability Strategy, which provides the blueprint to build a healthy environment and liveable Sunshine Coast, identifies the CHAS as a critical piece of work. The CHAS not only enables council to make better informed decisions about land-use and planning, it also underpins its disaster and risk management approach.

"Ît's imperative that we talk about climate change and in doing so, plan for our future," Mayor Jamieson said.

"In this way, our region will be identifying and adopting healthy, smart, creative solutions that will support the resilience of the Sunshine Coast for future generations."

Community consultation on the CHAS is scheduled to start from March 15 and during the first phase of consultation, residents are encouraged to submit photos and stories of historical events that represent the Sunshine Coast's dynamic and changing coastline.

LOCALS are all too familiar with the frustrating and dangerous congestion issues experienced daily at the roundabout at the intersection of Yandina Coolum Road, South Coolum Road and School Road.

There's no doubt the intersection is failing, with motorists often forced to queue back to the Motorway during peak periods. Throw in the unpredictable nature of school children

entering and exiting the school grounds, and it's a frightening accident waiting to happen. It's an issue I've been campaigning for since prior

The volume and speed of traffic along the DLW has continued to become a problem for the safety of pedestrians and people enjoying the cafés and retail shops along the front of Coolum. Many young children and elderly are being particularly challenged with the traffic constantly flowing along DLW as they try to make their way to the beach, Tickle Park and the boardwalk.

The wonderful street scaping, boardwalk and ocean vistas makes Coolum's beachfront a great place to be, however, with the population and traffic volume increasing the challenges will continue.

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Electoral commission to target unenrolled

THE AUSTRALIAN Electoral Commission will this week be sending text messages, emails and letters to almost half a million unenrolled Australians reminding them to join their fellow Australians on the electoral roll ahead of this year's federal election.

Electoral Commissioner, Mr Tom Rogers said a record 16.2 million people – an estimated 96.3 per cent of eligible Australians – were currently on the roll in what is already the largest and best enrolment rate in Australian history.

"We've worked very hard in recent years to increase the enrolment rate and it's terrific to see the electoral roll in excellent shape ahead of this year's federal election," Mr Rogers said.

"In the past decade we've witnessed massive and unprecedented growth – with the enrolment rate rising from 90.9 per cent at the 2010 federal election."

Mr Rogers said that each federal election the AEC processes hundreds of thousands of enrolment transactions in the week leading up to the enrolment deadline.

"We are very confident that, for the upcoming federal election, our enrolment efforts throughout the electoral cycle combined with upcoming AEC communication will produce the most complete and accurate roll Australia has ever had," Mr Rogers said.

"We remain committed to the full electoral participation of all eligible Australians, no matter where they live.

"Enrolment is not only about being on the roll, it is about being enrolled at your current residential address.

"The Australian Bureau of Statistics estimates approximately 50,000 Australians move house every week and while we capture a lot of that activity directly it is important that people who have moved recently check their enrolment and update their details when necessary."

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

It's great that John Windolf tirelessly collects rainfall data each month and the Advertiser publishes them (see page 4 of March 7-13 Advertiser).

If this didn't happen Coolum residents who love their gardens wouldn't know just how much Unitywater collects for the Council by overcharging households. John tells us January was the driest month on record, and February was much drier than average.

Unitywater assumes that 90% of metered water goes down the toilet/sink etc. and charges for sewerage services accordingly. This is ridiculous for those who love their gardens and use more water during dry spells. The latest Unitywater bill has charges of \$101 for water services and \$170 for sewerage, which is totally unfair as sewerage treatment flows are low in dry periods and most of the water used goes on the garden.

For the last three financial years Unitywater has sent a cheque of \$25 million to Sunshine Coast Council. Unitywater is a monopoly supplier yet the seven Executive Managers paid themselves more than \$2.4 million in 2016/17.

No wonder both Council and the State Government call Unitywater their 'Goldwater'.

EUTHANASIA LAW REFORM

Dear editor,

Time is running out for Queenslanders and other Australians to make their views known to our 93 state MPs on the issue of voluntary assisted dying law reform.

The cross-party Health Committee of the Queensland Parliament is conducting an inquiry into aged care, palliative care, and voluntary assisted dying and has set an April 15 deadline for submissions on its issues paper.

This is the first opportunity Queenslanders have had to have their views considered because our State Parliament has not previously examined voluntary assisted dying as other states and territories have done.

The Health Committee must report to the Parliament by November 30 and before then will hold public hearings where a limited number of people will be invited to give evidence and tell their stories in support of voluntary assisted dying.

But all Queenslanders can have their say right now by lodging a submission before April 15.

Information on the inquiry and how to make submissions can be found through the Queensland Parliament website — www.parliament.qld.gov.au.

Voluntary assisted dying laws will give people wider options at the end of life, and we must see action taken in this current term of the Queensland Parliament.

We must not wait until after the October 2020 state election and let more Queenslanders suffer needlessly.

Great numbers of fish were reported with some anglers catching plenty of elbow slapper fish from these areas. Flathead have been in good numbers - these fish have been more predominate on the run-out tide, fishing the edges of sand and mud banks has been where most of the fish have been taken with both lures and baits claiming fish. With some storms forecast this week the jacks should come on the bite. The one thing that really fires them up is a sudden change in the weather, and this in turn makes targeting them that bit easier. Live baits are by far the

On the offshore tides and waterways, there have been plenty of quality fish taken on the closer reefs, Coolum Reef, Arkwright shoals, Hancock Reef and the Gneerings are all prime reefs to target. Coolum reef is one of the popular reefs to head to, as it always seems to have a good population of coral trout at this time of the year. You can also expect to find snapper, sweetlip, parrot, pearl perch, cobia and jew all feeding on the bounty of bait fish on offer. For those of you that are itching for pelagic you may have to run a little wider to find Spanish and spotted mackerel. Fishing the Hards, Barwon Banks and the Reefs off Double Island should see you come into contact with some great fish.

On the beaches things have also improved greatly after some big swells hit the coast and created some great gutters in close. Whiting and dart have been in great numbers feeding on all the exposed pippies and beach worms. Jew and tailor numbers have

also improved with a lot of good-sized fish taken from the headlands. Fishing the incoming tide early morning or into the evening has seen the best results, mullet fillet pilchards, bonito fillet and tailor fillets have been great baits.
