Advisory board sought to shape coastal landscape

SUNSHINE Coast Council have begun the community consultation process for their, "Our Resilient Coast. Our Future" project in an effort to assist in developing the Sunshine Coast Coastal Hazard Adaptation Strategy.

The project seeks to develop a long-term strategy that proactively plans for the future management of our coastal areas while building on our existing knowledge.

Over the next 18-24 months, council will carry out a detailed assessment of current and future coastal hazards along our 60km coastline.

Planning Portfolio Councillor Christian Dickson said developing a long-term strategy would build awareness of the potential impacts of climate change. "By using the best available science, we'll improve our

"Through our community consultation, residents can share their collective experiences and knowledge of our coastline, as well as details of how our coastline has changed over time. "This will help build our knowledge, and to understand what is important to residents. It's important that our work aligns with our community's expectations and values." Professor John Martin, Independent Chair of the Community Advisory Group and Emeritus Professor at La Trobe University, said there were a number of ways for the community to take

part in the consultation.

"It's easy to be involved. We're inviting community members to share their photos, their memories and what they value about our coastline. They can do this in person at our events or through our interactive online map," Professor Martin said. "We are particularly interested in photos and stories of historical events that represent how our coastline has changed over time.

"Anyone who loves the coastline should head to council's website and subscribe to receive project updates, including notifications of our community events.

"We're also looking for residents to join our Community Advisory Group, which will play an integral role in the formation of council's strategy. "The formation of a Community Advisory Group is a tried and tested approach.

"When council and residents work closely together - as they did for the national award-winning Maroochy Groyne Field Renewal Project consultation positive outcomes can be achieved.

"We need people who are passionate, have an interest in the future of our coast and a range of skills or technical expertise. They should also have a genuine desire to create positive change.

"If this sounds like you, or someone you know, please consider applying."

Airport flight paths and Bowlo 70s and 80s party design open for review

SUNSHINE Coast Council's Airport Expansion Project is progressing well and remains on target for completion by the end of 2020 as scheduled. Sunshine Coast Council has engaged Airservices Australia, the nation's air navigation service provider, to finalise the flight path designs. Airservices Australia manages 11 per cent of the world's airspace in which there are more than four million aircraft movements carrying more than 156 million passengers annually.

The proposed flight paths and airspace changes for the new runway are progressing well and the designs were released for community and aviation industry comment on March 20. Sunshine Coast Council, Airservices Australia and the Sunshine Coast Airport will conduct information sessions and briefings to present the proposed airspace and flight path designs for the new runway. An analysis indicates that there will be minimal material change to the information originally included in the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) consultation process conducted in 2014 and 2015. Sunshine Coast Council Economic Development Portfolio Councillor Stephen Robinson said this was the final step in the airspace design process and while there are minimal changes to what was presented as part of the EIS, it is an opportunity for a more detailed look at how the airspace will operate once the new runway is in service. "The engagement program will run for six weeks, from Wednesday, March 20 until Tuesday, April 30 2019," Cr Robinson said.

Councillor Robinson said there would be several opportunities for the community to meet with Sunshine Coast Council, Airservices Australia and the Sunshine Coast Airport to find out more detail about the frequency, exact location and height of planes along the new flight paths.

"There will be drop-in sessions and pop-up information stands for the community during the engagement period and the opportunity to provide feedback via Airservices Australia's online portal," Cr Robinson said. Sunshine Coast Airport CEO Andrew Brodie said the finalisation of the airspace and flight paths was great news for the aviation industry.

"The new runway will enable Sunshine Coast Airport to attract new direct flights from longer-haul destinations in Australia, the Pacific and Asia," Mr Brodie said. For further information on the

ONE of Coolum's oldest and most loved cafes, 'The Caf' on Birtwill Street undertook a massive redesign and refurb in what can be described as giving reality TV show 'The Block' a run for their money – completed in just three days, the new design looks fresh and vibrant with a touch of Scandinavian flair. Owner Di Stevenson said the refurb was a long time coming and was first put on the drawing board some 15 months ago. "Working with my daughter Georgia who works for an architect in Brisbane we worked the redesign out and that involved moving the water station and turning the fridges around and then after a lot of work it

was on to the builders," Di said. Tim Lee from Coolum based Quality First Constructions did the job and the business do both residential and commercial fit outs, and amazingly did the Caf in just three days.

"Tim was amazing as he knew how important it was for us to minimise our down time - so he had all trades on deck and they worked until midnight one night to get the job done." The end result is one that is more spacious, light and the palette of black and white with stunning herringbone tiles from Coolum based Sunshine Living Tile & Stone works effortlessly with the splashes of warmth from the natural timber that is

used to accentuate the overall fresh and airy feel to the café. As with most renovations, the fit out did not come cheap and Di said it was a big investment, but one that was worth it. "It was a fair outlay, however

after 17 years, the business has given us a lot so we could justify putting the investment back in and we have worked hard here over the years."

Arguably one of the best cafes in Coolum and set back from the ocean views of the coastal stretch, the Caf proves that a quality product and good service is all that one needs to survive in the fickle world of hospitality - and quality they

The current round of consul-

tation by Air Services Australia for the proposed airspace changes for the new Sunshine Coast Airport runway has raised concerns that disturbed sleep and sleep deprivation are going to be a significant issue for residents who may be near the airport or flight path.

I attended the North Shore Community consultation sess on Saturday and some of the residents within the North Shore and Coolum areas are going to be particularly impacted by the proposed late night flights being sought by the airport operators. Approaches over locations like Marcus Beach and Verrierdale similarly would be impacted.

When I attended the session

on Saturday morning at the North Shore Community Centre, one of the residents, who is located in the North Beach estate had the level of noise identified as equivalent to that of a hand held hair drier. Clearly, this level of noise between 10 pm and 6 am would be a considerable disturbance.

I have pushed for the Sunshine Coast Airport to have a curfew not unlike that at Sydney Airport. If it is good enough for the residents of Sydney there should be no reason why a curfew should not apply at Sunshine Coast Airport.

The Sunshine Coast has been developing plans for a 24-hour airport with approaches and takeoffs over resident's homes and conservations areas and this in my opinion is a wellbeing issue for people and our wildlife.

DAVO'S NORTHSHORE BAIT & TACKLE

OFFSHORE reef species have certainly started to increase in size with the close in reefs like Gneerings smashing out trout, squire and sweetlip. Coolum is showing snapper with the better fish at first light - so get up there early to avoid missing the bite. There has been good snapper, sweetlip and moses perch on Murphy's Reef and Mooloolaba 9 mile, and the bigger fish have mainly been taken around dawn. Further out on the Barwon Banks has seen good snapper, pearl perch and moses perch as well as pearl perch. Tuna schools have been all up and down the coast with some big long tails amongst them. Fishing smaller profile slugs and smaller stick baits seems to be the way to tangle with them, with fish over the meter mark not uncommon.

On the beaches, whiting and dart have been the most com-

mon captures along the coast with some being caught in the gutters along Coolum Beach. Beach worms, pippies and peeled prawns have been the go. Smaller Jew and sweetlip have come from the rocks around Yaroomba, with fresh mullet and squid the baits of choice there.

In the Maroochy, the trusty






"By paying it forward you can make a difference in the life of someone else and these young players, especially Peace who has overcome huge hurdles to get here from Uganda are very

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
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
