## Noosa declares climate emergency in a first for QLD

NOOSA Council is the first Queensland local government to declare a climate emergency.

"This declaration sends a strong message to all levels of government that the time to take urgent action on climate change is right now," Mayor Tony Wellington said.

Council endorsed the climate declaration at the General Committee Meeting held on Monday July 15, and the declaration is expected to be ratified at the Ordinary Meeting held today.

"In making this declaration, Noosa Council joins other local governments in NSW, Victoria, SA and WA as well as the ACT government who have already

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THE OLD saying "a little goes a long way" rings true for how much damage a single piece of plastic can cause, whether ingested by a marine turtle or pelican, blocking the flow of a waterway or littering pathways.

However, 'little' acts of good the community takes this Plastic Free July also go a long way to better the Sunshine Coast's beaches, waterways, parks and overall environment.

Sunshine Coast Council has aligned with several community groups this month to raise awareness and create opportunities to eliminate or swap out single-use plastics or help pick up littered plastic across the region.

To help go plastic free, community members are invited to participate in a beach clean up, attend a hands-on workshop or documentary film screening, and join the Sunshine Coast Living Smart #BYOSunshineCoast challenge for a chance to win local prizes including a Whale One Cruise, TreeTop Challenge and plastic free kits.

Environment Portfolio Councillor Jenny McKay says that while Plastic Free July is a wonderful and necessary reminder to the community,

she'd like to see more people reducing and picking up waste all year long.

"I encourage everyone across the Sunshine Coast region, from the beaches to the hinterland, to take part in Plastic Free July this month," Cr McKay said.

"When you pick up a piece a plastic, or swap out a single-use plastic bottle for a reusable metal one, you'll not only feel better, but start a much needed habit that will better our overall environment.

"Make a pledge this Plastic Free July, and I challenge you to keep that pledge in the months and years to come.

"We're fortunate on the Sunshine Coast to have such pristine natural assets, so let's all do our part to keep them that way.'

Fortunately, over the past few years the region's beach clean ups have showed increased participation, and therefore improved impact.

Council's second annual Beach Clean Up Program report shows that more than 2,800 volunteers from all age groups engaged with the program, with the number of participants from schools, community groups and businesses up by more than 30 per

cent from last year.

The report also includes a comparison of local government areas across Australia and demonstrates the Sunshine Coast Council region has recorded the highest level of beach and waterway clean ups across the country over the past three years. This has been a combined effort of the Sunshine Coast community and council's beach and waterway clean up programs.

The Beach Clean Up Program is now in its third year, and initiatives are well underway to ensure that clean ups, and education and rubbish reduction projects are included as part of council's regular environmental efforts.

## What you can do this Plastic Free July | NINDERRY MP SLEEPS OUT FOR HOMELESSNESS

DAN PURDIE MP, State Member for Ninderry, is bracing himself for a cold night sleeping rough on Mooloolaba beach early next month in an effort to both raise awareness and funds for homelessness on the Sun-

He'll be joining other MP's, business leaders and local identifies who will be braving the elements as part of the annual Vinnies Community Sleepout to raise awareness, and funds, for vulnerable people in our community who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness.

Mr Purdie said that locally there are approximately 1,600 individuals without a home each night.

"With the rising costs of living and an ageing population, there is a risk that this number will continue to rise.

"Many factors can be attributed to homelessness, such as housing affordability, domestic violence, job loss and/or changes to one's mental/physical health

homelessness does not discriminate, and it is often not a choice, and can affect anyone, at any age."

Last year, \$180,000 was raised to provide immediate help to people in need by the refurbishment of nine housing units in Maroochydore.

"There is much more work to be done and Vinnie's intends to use this year's Sleepout proceeds towards resources for support workers and an affordable housing solution in Nambour," Mr Purdie said.

Across Queensland, it is estimated that 22,000 people are experiencing homelessness (ABS, 2016). However, this number is difficult to measure, as people without homes are not always counted in the Census. Homelessness is defined as people, including children, without a stable home, such as those who sleep outside or in their cars, or live in temporary, overcrowded or substandard accommodations.

Mr Purdie has volunteered to sleep out on August 8th and is calling on the local business community to join him with a sleeping bag and cardboard tent to help raise funds for this important cause.

"As well, everyone can take part by making a donation - even \$5 or \$10 will help make a difference in the lives of people experiencing or at risk of homelessness on the Sunshine Coast."

## **NOOSA DECLARES CLIMATE EMERGENCY IN A FIRST FOR QLD**

declared a climate emergency. In fact, 740 jurisdictions around the globe have made the declaration, including the national governments of the UK, Canada, Portugal and Ireland plus cities like Paris and New York.

"Meanwhile, the Australian Federal Government's own National Greenhouse Inventory reveals that we are not on track to meet our Paris Agreement targets. Indeed, overall emissions are trending up, not down," the Mayor said.

Across the globe, average land and sea temperatures continue to rise, with the last five years being the hottest on record. The most recent IPCC Report noted that humankind has just 12 years to take action to keep warming to less than 1.5 degrees and avoid more serious global catastrophes.

"Left unchecked, climate change has the potential for major consequences, particularly more severe weather events and Noosa is not

immune. As a coastal community we are particularly vulnerable to the impacts of

a changing climate. "Our Coastal Hazard Adaptation Plan will set out how Council prepares for, and responds to, increased severe weather events, storm surges, sea level rise and coastal erosion.

"At the local level, Council has an ambitious target to achieve net-zero emissions by 2026, and we will continue efforts to reduce emissions by implementing solar PV, identifying energy efficiencies and by making changes to our landfill site and our operations.

"We will also continue to work collaboratively with our community to achieve emission reduction goals across the shire," the Mayor said.

"We all need to take responsibility, and wealthy nations especially need to lead by example. Australia might only contribute 1.6 per cent of total global emissions, but we are home to just 0.33 per cent of the world's population. On a per capita basis then, that puts Australia near the top of the list of global emitters, higher than the USA or China. We are second only to a few Arab oil states when it comes to per capita greenhouse gas emissions.

"The science is clear and the weight of expert evidence is undeniable," the Mayor said.

"This is arguably the most pressing issue facing the planet today and Noosa Council will not duck for cover when faced with difficult tasks. We proudly join other governments across the planet in declaring a climate emergency and calling for immediate and swift action to minimise catastrophic global repercussions."

Noosa Council will be the 27th Australian local government to declare a climate emergency.

## More help needed for our most vulnerable

WE LIVE in paradise but it's not paradise for everyone with many vulnerable Sunshine Coasters experiencing homelessness.

Member for Maroochydore Fiona Simpson has called on the State Government to do more to support homeless people of all ages and demographics but particularly homeless men over the age of 25 - with men making up more than half the number of homeless

Ms Simpson said that in response to a Question she asked in Parliament recently (QON No. 734), the Housing Minister's response showed there were no funds allocated for emergency housing locally for men over 25.

Ms Simpson has called on the Minister for Housing to provide more funding for organisations like the Maroochy Neighbourhood Centre who work hard to give homeless people the care and support they need and also for more funding for emergency housing for homeless men over the age of 25.

"While there are needs for women and young people as well, men make up more than half the number of homeless people but there are no funds allocated in Maroochydore for emergency housing for homeless men over 25, according to the Minister for Housing's answer to a question I asked in Parliament recently," Ms Simpson said.

"We have some great local organisations and agencies like the Maroochy Neighbourhood Centre, IFYS and St Vincent de Paul who are working hard to provide homeless people with care and support, but I am particularly concerned that more Government help is needed to support homeless men break this cycle.

"Homelessness affects all types of people from all different backgrounds and it's a problem affecting our community that can sometimes be largely invisible and overlooked as people who hit rough times can be forced to sleep in cars, on the beach or couch surf at a friend's place.

"Housing is becoming less affordable on the Sunshine Coast and in addition to that, homelessness can be a result of different factors out of a person's control, whether due to loss of a job, relationship break-up, domestic violence or due to mental or physical illness.

"Whatever the reason, the challenge is how we help the vulnerable get the support and care they need to get their lives back on track.

"That's why I am asking the Minister for more funding for organisations like the Maroochy Neighbourhood Centre who provide for practical needs like meals, showers, laundry services and health facilities for those who are homeless, as well as helping people to get a roof over their heads "

Companies like 'Cash Converters" and pay-day loans, especially now online, are similar predators to banks placing ATMs in gambling venues. ## New water meters this month for Coolum

DURING July Unitywater will be identifying and replacing water meters nearing the end of their life cycle in Marcoola, Coolum Beach and Mount Coolum.

This work is part of Unitywater's annual infrastructure maintenance program.

Affected residents will receive a notification card in their letterbox at least 48 hours before any works and, if they are home on the day

of the work, Unitywater's authorised contractor will make contact with them prior to replacing the meter.

Following meter replacement, the contractor will leave a Works Completed card in the resident's letterbox which records the water consumption measured by the old meter. Customers are advised to keep this reading for reference and to cross check when they receive their next Unitywater

# Remembering Brenda Perry

BRENDA Vallack Perry (nee Single) passed away peacefully on July 7 - the active and good-humoured Marcoola local was only recently fondly celebrated in September 2016 with her extended family and friends throwing her a surprise 80th Birthday at the Coolum Beach Hotel

Born on September 6, 1936 in West Wyalong NSW Brenda was the third child of six to Nancy and Paddy Single. Brenda attended high school at Bega, before serving in the Australian Airforce from 1954 -1957. A chance meeting with Richard (Dick) Perry when she was 21 quickly turned to romance - marrying on April 3, 1958. They settled at Kogarah where they had their children Kim, Jody and Jenny, before moving to Carramah where their youngest daughter Lisa was born in 1963.

In 1973 the Perry family decided to escape the big city rat-race, and hitched the caravan to the truck, packed in the four kids and the family dog, and

moved North to Cotton Tree – Brenda drove the old Ford up while Dick towed the caravan. For the first few years the family lived in the caravan at Cotton Tree Caravan Park. Dick found work as a grader driver for the council making sand dunes at Cotton Tree, and in 1976 Brenda took on the role of managing Cotton Tree Casuals clothing store.

Brenda, Dick and the family could usually be found at the beach either body surfing, or capturing action shots and video of their son Jody and the other local surfers on the waves, and soon the couple were helping at the regular fundraisers for the fledgling North Shore Boardriders Assoc. The Perry family went into partnership with Eric Cowley in buying Sunshine Surf Centre at Cotton Tree in 1977

Brenda and Dick sold the surf shop in 1982 and moved to Moore where they lived for 10 years before packing up again for a move to Bauple in 1992. Their love of the coastal life eventually lured them back to the beach and they settled in Marcoola in 2005. Dick passed away in 2012 and their daughter Kim passed away in 2014.

Brenda was active in retirement, taking regular trips with the local senior citizens group and enjoying regular trips to play bingo and pokies with her friends. Her quick wit, ready laugh, and loving nature endeared her to all who knew

Brenda leaves behind three children, eight grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren. Please refer to Funeral Notice for details of Brenda's farewell.

I AM IN love with the world and having just returned from a visit to a World Heritage site at Angkor Wat in Cambodia and meeting so many beautiful people on the journey, the love has grown even deeper.

We travelled to Cambodia with a responsible tourism operator that tries to

minimise negative social, cultural, economic and environmental impacts. These operators generate greater economic benefits for local people and enhance the well being of host communities.

We were told that the Cambodian Government is intending to grow tourism from 3 million to 8 million foreign visitors over the next few years. The impact of large numbers of tourists, hotels, condominiums and casinos is already having a significant impact - making it difficult to maintain traditional lifestyles.

In Australia we see the traditional owners' decision to permanently close access to climb to the top of one of their most sacred places Uluru. The large numbers of tourists' queuing as they scale to the top is against the wishes of traditional owners.

Similarly, we have seen the scramble to the top of Everest in Nepal while the neighbouring country of Bhutan's local customs do not allow the climbing to the top of the Himalayas. Also, Bhutan limits the number of foreign tourists to protect its culture.

World tourism is a wonderful way to understand other peoples, however there is also a need for responsible tourism to protect places and these peoples.

On the Sunshine Coast tourism is one of the mainstays of our economy and in Marcoola we enjoy welcoming visitors and will continue to as long as it does not negatively impact. Some impacts of tourism on our special place Mount Coolum can already be seen and this needs to be carefully managed.

I still call Marcoola home and like the lyrics of the song by Peter Allen "I Still Call Australia Home". To be able to continue to call Coolum and the North Shore home we need to ensure that governments and operators in the tourism industry apply responsible tourism principles.


## TROY ASCOTT COOLUM STATE HIGH SCHOOL

More than half our population\* will travel by air for business or pleasure at least once this year, but many will commute to Brisbane first because our local airport runway cannot accommodate the larger aircraft for long haul flights.

We're doing something about that! Sunshine Coast Council is building a new runway that's bigger, wider and better aligned with prevailing winds so our community can access the world from the Sunshine Coast.

A new runway and better facilities means greater accessibility and more opportunities for work, tourism and exporting businesses.

The Sunshine Coast Airport Expansion Project didn't just happen overnight. It's been a long time in the making. This project has been the subject of extensive consultation with the community - in both the Sunshine Coast Council and Noosa Shire areas - over many years. It has the approvals required from all levels of government to proceed. Construction of the new runway is underway and is due for completion in 2020.

The proposed flight paths to support the new runway have been in the public domain for nearly five years and remain so to this day. These flight paths have been the subject of extensive public information and consultative processes along the way.

The airspace around the Sunshine Coast is very constrained by safety considerations, terrain, populated areas and the fact that this region is part of the Brisbane Basin and therefore its flight paths are close to, and intersect with, the airspace and flight paths servicing the Brisbane Airport and Amberley Air Base.

Airservices Australia has made it clear there are very few options in terms of potential viable flight paths for the new runway and that the concept flight paths that have been published since 2014 and subject to community consultation provide a good basis for the detailed design of the new flight paths.

The new runway at the Sunshine Coast Airport will benefit the whole community and we look forward to it opening our region to the world.

## NICE BREAM IN THE MAROOCHY RIVER

#### **DAVO'S NORTHSHORE BAIT & TACKLE**

WITH A stunning weekend at play, plenty of anglers were able to get out for a winter fish. Bream catches have started to show up a bit further up river try fishing the rocky outcrops and structures like jetty's and pontoons around Twin Waters, Maroochy Waters and Bli Bli Bridge. Casting small minnows and curly tail plastics like the Zman Grubz in 2.5 inch are perfect. For the baits anglers, try fresh mullet strips, yabbies and chook or mullet.

Twin Waters has also been good for trevally, Gt's and big eye are on the chew with most fish hitting surface lures like the Zippin Ziggy and Sugapens. Nice size flathead have been taking on soft plastics around Goat and Chambers Island, and the banks just up from the Jet Ski Run. Black Banks, Cotton Tree and Picnic Point are holding nice size whiting with the bigger fish taking worms and yabbies on the last of the run in tide.

good whiting on the chew with worms - the best areas are north of Coolum Beach on the run out tide. Mudjimba Beach seems to be the spot if chasing a good feed of dart. This stretch is holding top looking gutters at the moment, which is perfect for these fish. Tailor numbers are starting to improve with the best results coming from around the river mouths and off the rocks around Coolum. Slide Baiters are seeing plenty of sharks with reports of some bigger sharks at night on live baits.

Offshore has been a little quiet due to the southerly over the weekend, but there was plenty of action late last week. Plenty of snapper have come from those closer reefs with most fish between 50 and 60 cm, there hasn't been a lot of run so the fish are responding well to whole baits and plastics fished through a quality burly trail. The Gneerings, Murphy's and Currimundi have all produced some nice snapper. Caloundra wide was good for amber jack, bigger cobia, pearl

perch and some nice mauri cod. Those that did fish over the weekend tended to hang a little closer - good areas include out front of Mooloolaba Rocks and Alex Headland.

SURF LIFESAVING patrols will increase during busy holiday periods following Sunshine Coast Council's decision to increase its allocation for this service to \$4.84 million in the 2019-20 budget.

Funding has increased by \$236,000 which will provide an additional 4,914 patrol hours across the Sunshine Coast including Coolum Beach.

The additional services will run between September and May and will include a new roving lifeguard service between Marcoola and Twin

Additional services will continue to be added in the future, including introducing patrols at Bokarina from September 2020.

Lifeguard services are delivered by Surf Life Saving Queensland (SLSQ) on behalf of council.

Mayor Mark Jamieson said the additional funding would further address the key recommendations endorsed by council in the Sunshine Coast Lifeguard Services Plan 2018-22.

"Our world-class beaches are one of the outstanding features of our Sunshine Coast," Mayor Jamieson said.


"They offer a fantastic experience – whether in the waves or on the sand - and we want those experiences to be safe for everyone.

SLSQ Chief Lifeguard Greg Cahill said the additional services would help ensure the safety of the growing number of people who visited the region's beaches every year.


