Wheely friendly office on the way after impasse

Member for Maroochydhore Fiona Simpson's Electorate Office is moving from near the RSL to new wheel-chair accessible premises in Horton Parade.

Fiona thanked disability advocates who raised the problem about the current office's lack of wheel-chair access, saying they had been heard.

"It's true that one dear gentleman's wheelchair got stuck going into my office which is just totally unacceptable. Also the very steep ramp outside the front door was not compliant

and was difficult to negotiate. The good news is that the new office when fully opened in a few weeks' time will meet the standards for disability access which will be great," Fiona said.

"In the meantime, the Maroochydhore Electorate office will move out of the location on the corner of First Avenue and Memorial Avenue into temporary offices for several weeks October 21 until we can make the final move into the new office near QML in Horton Parade hopefully late November.

"Despite this double move, it's business as usual and people can contact me on the same phone number and email. The only difference is I have no meeting room at the moment so appointments by prior arrangement will be in coffee shops until the new office opens. The coffee is on me.

"People can still contact my office on phone number 5406 7100 or maroochydhore@parliament.qld.gov.au to seek help for State matters," Fiona said.

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A look back in time

A LONG TIME COOLUM RESIDENT WITH A PASSION FOR LOCAL HISTORY

Yaroomba's first developer?

WHEN thinking of Yaroomba and its early history, many people refer to the area as 'Coronation Beach', the name given by developer Alfred Grant in the early 1950s, to honour the approaching coronation of Queen Elizabeth II, but later dropped as the same name had been given to an estate in Western Australia. At this time, because of the deep gully near Mona Vista Court, the journey from Coolum involved driving for at least twenty minutes, along today's South Coolum Road, Yarrock Street, Jenyor Street, Warran Road and Neurum Road.

Few people, though, know about a man who made his

home in the area in the late 1800s, and who played a big part in the early development of the Coolum district. His name was George Picken, who had been born in Richmond, Tasmania, in 1842. It is thought that he joined the Bendigo gold rush in the late 1850s, and then followed gold seekers to Gympie in the 1860s, without much luck. By the 1880s he had made his way to the Maroochy River area, where he worked for prominent Yandina settler John Low for more than thirty-five years, and was described as "a loyal friend and employee". John Low was heavily involved in timber getting and milling,

and George Picken was active in these activities, along with indigenous workers, including 'Donald' and 'Martin', and many others, cutting timber and rafting it up the Maroochy River to Yandina.

John Low kept meticulous records in, and his 'Day Book' shows that George Picken built the first road in the Coolum area, from today's Toolga Street to the area we now know as Coolum Creek wharf, starting in 1899. For his work with shovel and a horse-drawn scoop, he earned five shillings [50 cents] a day. During this period, which took quite some time, Picken lived in the area we now know as Birrahl Park, in a humpy he made from bark

and bits of wood.

George Picken's fascination with gold continued throughout his life, and although he found none in the Coolum area, he is believed to have found some gold near North Arm, in an area where a mine operated in the late twentieth century. He also lived near Yandina, and when he retired, aged an early seventy, he selected land on the Ninderry Range.

There is no memorial to George Picken anywhere in the Yaroomba area, or in the area of greater Coolum, but he deserves to be remembered as a man who trod lightly on our area and cared for it, at a time when the land was unspoiled.

completion in mid 2020.

BETTER WEATHER GETS ANGLERS FISHING

DAVO'S NORTHSHORE BAIT & TACKLE

SOME good weather over the weekend saw plenty of anglers out on the river.

Crabs in the river are on the move after the recent rains with most anglers reporting good catches with well baited pots.

Nice size whiting have been reported throughout the lower reaches - try Black Banks, Chambers Island and the back of Goat Island. Best performing baits have been worms, yabbies and soldier crabs.

Flathead are on the move with catches taken on soft plastics and vibes. Power baits in Nemesis style have been a proven performer with the Samaki Thumper soft vibe running a close second. Top spots have been around the back of Goat Island and the mouth of Eudlo and Petrie Creeks on the run out tides.

Mangrove jacks are favouring the deeper holes and structures around the lower reaches of the river. Lures such as the Zerek Fish Trap are responsible for taking some of the bigger fish.

Twin Waters has seen a few trevally down near and inside the weir, with most fish taking surface lures at first light on the incoming tide.

Offshore anglers were blessed with some nice weather windows, so those that did get out were well rewarded. Those close in reefs like the Gneerings, Murphys and Coolum have produced good size snapper, grass sweetlip and jew with baits such as pillies and squid responsible for the catches. Ensure you have a floating pillie out on these local reefs, as there have been quite a few cobia taken this way.

Banks saw red throats, quality snapper, sweetlip and Moses perch in the 35 to 50 metre mark with most fish taken on bait.

Mackerel numbers are starting to pick up as the warmer currents come down from the north - fishing slow trolled baits on Davo's Spanish special rigs is a great way to cover ground and maybe attract that big Spanish.

Spanner Crab season is about to close so we will all have to wait till Mid December to get your traps out. If you have never fished for

spanners call into the store and have a chat to the guys to get you set for the opening of the season.

On the beaches, with a bit of swell over the past few weeks have seen a few more gutters starting to open up between Northshore to Coolum resulting in some nice fish.

Whiting numbers are picking up along this stretch with the lower water showing the better catches. Quality beach worms either cured or live have been responsible for those bigger fish.

Flathead are respond-

ing well to small pillies and peeled prawns with most fish coming from the shallow water gutters.

There has been the occasional tailor taken on strip baits such as bonito with the high tide gutters near the mouth of the river and Yaroomba rocks the better areas.
