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
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HOWZAT? COOLUM FIELDS DIVISION 1 CRICKET TEAM

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

for about seven years and it keeps building as we go along.

"Last year we had about 75 and this year we expect about 90 to play and it's a great day for the money with a round of golf, two alcoholic drinks, a BBQ and each player receives a goodie bag full of items from our sponsors," Bruce said.

Noosa Biosphere Reserve gets the nod of approval from UNESCO's 10-year review

NOOSA Shire's place among the world's biosphere reserves is assured for another decade, with UNESCO giving Noosa Biosphere Reserve the 10-year tick of approval.

Mayor Tony Wellington said the acknowledgement is another win for the region.

"It is wonderful to receive confirmation that UNESCO has not only confirmed the ongoing status of the Noosa Biosphere Reserve, but that they have done so with accolades.

"Noosa Shire was designated a Biosphere Reserve in 2007 by UNESCO's Man and the Biosphere program. In true pioneering Noosa fashion, it was the first biosphere designation in Queensland," he said.

The World Network of Biosphere Reserves, which

recognises areas that demonstrate a balanced relationship between nature and people, now consists of 701 biosphere reserves in 124 countries.

In its review, the Advisory Committee acknowledged the efforts to manage tourism and the Noosa Biosphere Reserve Foundation's initiatives across the restoration of fish in the river and work on koala populations.

"All Biosphere Reserves are required to carry out periodic reviews and report back to UNESCO. This is Noosa's first assessment, and it appears we passed with flying colours.

"The Advisory Committee noted our Zero Emissions Noosa objective, and encouraged authorities to continue efforts to reach this goal. They also commended Noosa on its efforts to deal with feral ani-

mals that present major threats to biodiversity conservation, entitling us to share our experiences with other biosphere reserves that also suffer from invasive species."

Mr Wellington said this achievement must be shared by many.

"I want to thank everyone who has been directly or indirectly involved in the Noosa Biosphere Reserve management and activities over the past 12 years.

"The Man and the Biosphere program seeks to encourage actions that improve the overall relationship between people and their environment. Enjoying a great living and working environment, whilst protecting and respecting the natural environment - that's exactly what Noosa is all about."

Pet registration renewals now overdue

A REMINDER to all dog and cat owners on the Sunshine Coast that pet registrations renewals were due by September 30, and reminder notices are now being sent out.

Registering your pet is a key part of responsible pet ownership and infringement notices will soon be issued for any outstanding registrations. The

infringement for unpaid renewals is \$266.

If you haven't received a renewal notice, your pet's details have changed or you no longer own your pet, you must contact council as soon as possible to update your details and avoid receiving an infringement.

Significant registration fee

discounts apply for dog and cat owners who have had their pets de-sexed and micro-chipped with the cost being just \$14 or free for pensioners.

There is also the option of a lifetime registration for desexed and micro-chipped cats that is only \$81 with no annual renewal required.

Registration is free for pets under six-months-old.

There are several convenient payment methods available, including online payments via MyCouncil or BPAY, over the phone or at a council customer contact centre.

Dr Harry explains that two of his specialist areas are skin cancer and weight management – having lost an incredible 31kgs two years ago, he is all too familiar with the struggle of weight loss.

"Two years ago I basically decided it was time to change work and stress made me whack on a stack of weight and I lost it by looking at what I eat

and going to the gym.

"I do have a very active interest in weight management and I am really understanding of what it is to be overweight and I am absolutely keen as mustard to help people with weight issues."

When it comes to skin cancer checks, Dr Harry said that his extra training in the field has afforded him the ability to be able to perform thorough examinations.

"Skin cancer is rife in the southern hemisphere and any person who has had sun exposure needs to be checked and it is important that one is able to offer a thorough skin check – people are surprised to know that you can get a melanoma on your inner eyelid, so its vital to do thorough checks."

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

A look back in time

THE PROSPECT that a billion dollar Kelly Slater backed 'Surf Ranch' may be built on the western side of the Sunshine Motorway has recently been a topic of discussion in the Coolum district. Some of this discussion has referred to the suitability of the site, which is on a declared flood plain area, while other discussions have focussed on the sporting opportunities which it could provide, and on the tourism and accommodation attractions of this specialised facility.

On hearing of the proposed site of the Surf Ranch, we remembered an incident in the mid 1990s, at the south western end of the site. Returning from Maroochydore one afternoon, during a very wet period which had left flood water just covering the young sugar cane growing beside the motorway, we suddenly saw a motorboat, towing a water skier, travelling

at speed over the cane field ... we have never known who these adventurous fellows were, but their activity deserves to be recorded!

Although there have been other very wet periods in the same area, a notable incident which occurred ninety years ago has been recorded in a striking photograph taken close to the area where the Surf Ranch is proposed. Jean Ross, who had attended Coolum Provisional School in the early 1920s, earned her living in the late 1920s and early 1930s by driving a horse and buggy four miles each way to and from Coolum Creek wharf three times a week. On the outward journey she would collect mail, grocery and meat orders from nearby farms, and deliver them to the mail boat owner, Mr Coulson. When he next returned she would deliver the goods that he had brought on the boat from Yandina to fulfil those

orders. For this delivery service, she charged one shilling (10 cents) from each household – although it was recorded that not everyone paid regularly.

Jean, who later married George Warren, had many adventures during those years, negotiating through hail, rain or flood. One notable experience was captured in a photograph from 1929 which was treasured by her family, and given to us by her son, Vince Warren, before he died in 2018. It shows her negotiating the area in an extremely bad flood, which rose higher than the floor of her buggy. She paused to check the mail, which she kept in a tin trunk to keep it waterproof, but the trunk had floated away and was several yards behind her. Fortunately, on this journey she was accompanied by a 'scout' riding a horse in front, to keep her on the road, and he was able to retrieve the trunk, and save the day!

Coolum High's senior students are setting benchmarks for themselves and for our community. The future is bright and I can't wait to see what they do in the future.



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

NIGHT ANGLERS HAVE BEEN CLEANING UP

DAVO'S NORTHSORE BAIT & TACKLE

FISHING the Maroochy River at night has really been producing the goods lately. One such fish that responds well at nighttime is the man-grove jack. Jacks hide in their snags all through the day but come out to feed at night and can be found feeding out on the flats - large paddle tailed soft plastics worked slowly can produce some great jack.

For those of you that are not night owls and prefer an early start, fishing the river mouth has also paid off with bream, trevally and tailor claimed over the last week. Whiting are also in good numbers and freshly pumped yabbies and worms have been the go to bait. Fishing the run out tide around Black Banks and Goat Island has seen some nice fish.

Mud crab numbers are also improving as the waters warm and there is a bit of fresh in the system, set your pots in those deeper holes with mullet as bait. Don't forget the bag limits have changed for mud crabs from ten down to seven and you can only keep the bucks.

With summer approaching the beaches are the place to be. Being up nice and early and timing it with an incoming tide, will see you in good stead. Maroochy North Shore to Mudjimba, Coolum Beach, Peregian Beach and all the way up to Sunshine have been the place to be with some excellent catches being reported. Make sure you look for the gutters with the tide moving in - with bream, whiting, tailor and plenty of dart are around. A couple of the most favoured baits for the beach is a lightly weighted peeled prawn, small pillies, and strip baits of mullet or bonito fillet. Cast out into a surf gutter and allow to drift under the foam where the fish feel safe and will feed.

The mackerel are starting to show up with schools of both school and spotted mackerel tearing through baitfish schools around Laguna bay in Noosa. The good old floater has been working well - for the lure anglers give slugs and stick baits a go. Murphy's Reef has been good for cobia, moses perch and sweet lip and the last of the bigger snapper.

Sunshine reef has been great for sweetlip, pan sized squire and the perfect table fish - coral trout.

The Barwon Banks have been worth the trip when the weather allows with red emperor, snapper and plenty of mixed reefies. Soft plastics and micro jigs are working really well with the bottom bouncers and in some cases are starting to out fish bait.

The great thing about them is that you tend not to get the pickers and catch those quality fish.
