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


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WELCOME TO SUMMER COOLUM

Questions raised over surf ranch proposal and consultation

COMMUNITY groups and local residents are concerned the consultation period for the proposed surf ranch earmarked for a parcel of ex cane land adjacent to the Sunshine Motorway in Coolum, has not been thorough enough and the local community have been left in the dark as to the details and scale of the proposal.

World Surf League (WSL) and Consolidated Properties (CPG) are partnering to build a Kelly Slater Surf Ranch – featuring an artificial wave pool on 510 hectares of disused cane land at Coolum Beach – the proposal is also set to feature 1500 residential lots, commercial, retail and hotel complexes.

The land is zoned as a key



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QUESTIONS RAISED OVER SURF RANCH PROPOSAL AND CONSULTATION

resource area and will require state government approval to move the project forward.

Upcoming state government election candidate for Davison 9 Maria Suarez, has voiced concerns that many in the local community are unaware of the proposal and that the few community consultations thus far have been inadequate.

Ms Suarez is also concerned the methods being used to get the project across the line via state authorities are misleading.

"On the surface it looks like a positive project for the area... I've spoken with Consolidated Properties, emailed KPMG and I'm asking questions.

"The consultation is more of a sales pitch than true consultation and it is solely promoting the benefits of the project where the details are vague or unavailable and the true nature of the project is at this stage questionable," Ms Suarez said.

A community survey for Coolum has recently closed, however those concerned over the proposal have stated that very few in the community even knew about it.

"The problem is that the survey was promotional and didn't include any details about accessibility or price and wasn't widely distributed. The only social sites that had a link to the survey were on the Coolum Surf Club, Coolum Tourism and Regional Development Sunshine Coast Facebook pages, with resident and community associations left out of the loop

- collecting responses solely from supporters doesn't pass the pub test," Ms Suarez said.

In response to these claims, CPG CEO & Chairman, Don O'Rorke stated that the group have demonstrated their commitment to community engagement by undertaking 50 one-on-one meetings, online feedback, meetings with the local surfing community and Sunshine Coast Environment Council (SCEC) and an online survey to 500 people.

"We are keen to continue to engage with the community about the opportunity that Surf Ranch Sunshine Coast represents, and we are keen to continue to hear the community's views and for locals to influence the outcome and the nature of what we create," Mr O'Rorke said.

CPG also expect that any formal planning process will also include further community consultation.

SCEC have also raised concerns over the proposal with a spokesperson from the environmental lobby group stating that the project represents, "An intensive urban development on a floodplain with an ambitious and exclusive 'surf ranch' part of the overall concept."

"The site lies within a particularly low-lying area of the Maroochy River floodplain where it already experiences tidal inundation as well as being extremely flood-prone.

"Catchment-wide flood modelling for the dynamic Maroochy Catchment and climate change projections shows intensification of development on an already highly

modified floodplain resulting in loss of flood storage capacity is likely to create significant impacts on already vulnerable communities," the SCEC spokesperson said.

CPG maintain that they are aware of the concerns being raised about flooding and have engaged the best consultants in Australia on the matter and will work with the government to meet all requirements.

"Essentially, creating a large body of water on the Surf Ranch site will allow flood waters to be retained and retarded before being discharged to Coolum Creek," Mr O'Rorke said.

"WSL is very committed to the environment, as their record in the USA demonstrates, and would not have engaged with our company (CPG) & Hutchinson Builders on a project that had any adverse environmental impacts.

In fact, WSL has chosen the Sunshine Coast as a community in which they'd like to operate because they know local residents share their commitment to the environment and sustainability, Mr O'Rorke said.

The original Kelly Slater surf ranch is located in California and features "the perfect wave" as designed by the 11-time world surfing champ. The \$1 billion Coolum surf ranch proposal is still in the early stages and will need state government approval before proceeding further.

SEKISUI

Dear editor,
Whilst the Sekisui proposal for Yaroomba is being contested on "environmental" legal grounds, it is worth putting other aspects of their proposal into perspective. Sekisui's interest is not about a hotel, never has been - has anyone ever seen a statement of support from Westin Hotels? If there is a need and it seems Clive Palmer is in the prime location with a golf course and beach access doesn't see there is, then that could be built within the preview of the existing town plan.

Sekisui's interest is about the 740+ dwellings of up to seven storeys - their core business. Realestate.com currently shows there are more than 800 dwellings available for sale or rent within the Yaroomba postcode - more than when Sekisui made their application to council. Somehow, Sekisui believes that double this number (albeit without supporting infrastructure) would create a demand? This is not the experience of their adjoining

"Coolum Residences", which they have struggled to sell over many years ... they're dreaming at ratepayers expense, courtesy of the council! Meanwhile, the Marriott/Westin group reported a 23% drop in profit last quarter - so the hotel business is not exactly booming in the face of increased competition, as would be the case here with 13 hotels/resorts closer to the airport and Airbnb etc.

AIRPORT ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERN

Dear editor,
Palisade, or Sunshine Coast Airport Pty Ltd (SCAPL), the new 'owners' of a ratepayer's asset, boasted recently in their pretty picture book 'SCA Master Plan' that SC Airport became Australia's first carbon neutral airport in 2017, and SCAPL will continue to take ambitious

steps toward sustainability in operations, reflecting the values of the company and the community. However, what they don't tell us is that in the 2014 airport expansion Environmental Impact Statement (EIS, Chapter D4 - Air quality and greenhouse gas emissions, page 347) it states CO2 emissions from commercial flights will increase almost three times the 2012 levels by 2020, and eight times the 2012 levels by 2040.

How do they propose to negate this?

No amount of solar farms, waste recycling, composting, rainwater tanks, LED lighting, etc. can mitigate this massive increase in climate changing pollution emitted from the proposed large increase in commercial flights, which will make the 'carbon neutral airport' claim redundant.

What a joke Palisade. It also makes a mockery of complicit Sunshine Coast Council's bid for a Biosphere. There is the PFAS fiasco to consider too. All in all an environmental disaster!

Of the three airport alternatives in 2013, the "do nothing" and the "do the least" options were far more financially prudent than the "new runway" option chosen.

If council had wanted to promote the environment, it would have selected one of the two options that were not grandiose.

A look back in time

A LONG TIME COOLUM RESIDENT WITH A PASSION FOR LOCAL HISTORY



A TICKLE IN THE PARK

THE NAME of Coolum's most popular park – Tickle Park – amuses many people, and the question "Who was tickled in the park?" has been asked many times. With Christmas, New Year and Australia Day festivities in the park fast approaching, this question is sure to be repeated often.

Tickle Park actually owes its name to a very shy bachelor and keen conservationist. Edward George "Bob" Tickle came to Coolum shortly before World War II, after driving railway engines in various parts of Queensland. Once here, he found a spot close to the beach to build a hut – largely of galvanised iron and driftwood, in the area where the recently closed Information Centre stands. Bob may have lived in a hut, but he was meticulously tidy, and kept the area around his hut spotless, and extended his efforts to the Life Savers clubhouse nearby.

Together with two other

local bachelors, Martin Oosthuizen and Harold "Shaky" Goode, Bob Tickle spent many years planting trees along the foreshore, particularly where huge sand-blows occurred near the clubhouse, and this conservation work and his tidiness led to a degree of respect from the community, who accepted him as one of their own. There cannot be many places whose Progress Association accepts with pleasure the membership of an unemployed person in an illegally-built shack on public land, but Bob Tickle became so valued that in 1935 he was given a "COUNCIL AUTHORITY TO ACT", which read "The bearer of this Authority, Edward G. Tickle... is authorised by the council of the Shire of Maroochy to take action to preserve trees, either natural or planted in position, or any works carried out on roads or reserves.

Mr Tickle is authorised to invoke the aid of the police, if he considers such action necessary." At Christmas time, when Coolum children celebrated their school break-up in the nearby shelter shed, the eldest boy and girl were always deputed to go to Bob Tickle's hut, to invite him to join the children, their parents and the schoolteacher in their festivities, as their honoured guest.

When Bob Tickle died in 1956, the Nambour Chronicle reported that "He was always esteemed... for his cheery personality and his numerous acts of kindness [he] will be especially remembered for his love of [the] trees... he planted, tended and protected... The lovely grove of casuarinas and pandanus trees he planted as seedlings... have now grown into a fitting memorial... [and] the Shire Council [has named] Tickle Park in his honour."

As the crowds fill Tickle Park during our summer season, it is hoped that some people will remember the legacy Bob Tickle left our town.

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


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ACTION HEATING UP WITH WARMER WATER

DAVO'S NORTHSHERE BAIT & TACKLE

THE MAROOCHY River has seen an increase in water temperature over the last fortnight and this has woken up many summer species and is providing fisho's with lots of great captures. The lower stretches of the river have seen summer whiting and other species of fish being caught on both bait and lures. For some expert tips of how to catch these tasty fish be sure to come in and say G'day.

Flathead have also been the ticket this week with fish up to 75cm being caught after their annual spawn. These fish are hungry so now is a great time to chase these larger fish during run out tides. Lure fisho's have been having success on these fish using 4-5 inch grubs and paddle tails like the Molix RT shad and smaller divers such as the Atomic shiner 75 in herring colour. Bait fisho's haven't been missing out either with multiple large fish being boated on baits such as small pilchards and whole prawns allowed to drift lightly in the current.

The larger spring tides washed lots of bait into the river, which attracted multiple species of trevally. Areas to look around include the Cod Hole and river mouth with live baits and surface walkers the best methods. If intending to target these fish with surface lures, be sure to get to your chosen spot nice and early. As the first rays of sunlight appears, these fish will pack hunt and attack these bait fish so be ready.

Jacks have been fired up, with fish being captured around the upper reaches of Petrie creek and Maroochy River. These fish have been taken on live mullet as well as strip baits such as salted bonito fillet and mullet fillet. Be sure to have a night session when chasing these guys as it is the time when they predominantly hunt. Anglers have also seen some success around the Cod Hole.

The offshore scene is firing up with anglers catching the

occasional school and Spanish mackerel as well as some big Mahi Mahi. These Mahi love a cube of unweighted pilchard or a larger stickbait like the Shimano rockslide - retrieved at speed it is ready to handle these big fish. Reefies have been prevalent around the inner Gneerings and Coolum Reef patches with the most success an hour off the slack tide. Fishing baits such as pillies and squid will see the best result for these delicious reef dwellers. Grassy

emperor as well as tusk fish and Moses perch have been on the table as well as smaller snapper. The bigger fish are already seeking cooler waters and this month is still a great time to get a huge fish before they move further south.
