DIV 9 CANDIDATE

Dear editor,
In reference to Ken Dredge's letter in Advertiser January 23, I'd like to respond as a Candidate for Division 9 of the Sunshine Coast Regional Council.

The Sunshine Coast is a community of communities and this is reflected in the

Town Plan. Development is limited north of the river to retain the character of less urban communities with lower height limits, restriction on densities and vast tracts of land which are unsuitable for residential development. I believe that since 2014, the Town Plan has had too many ad hoc amendments and allowed for too many relaxations. In my opinion, development applications need to adhere to the Town Plan and not come with an expectation of approval outside of these restrictions.

I am a strong supporter of The Blue Heart project, which is a joint initiative between Sunshine Coast

Regional Council, Unity Water and Department of Environment and Science. The project is designed to manage the most critical areas of the floodplain, strengthen the Maroochy-Noosa Wallum Corridor and provide an alternative income source for private landholders via Blue Carbon. This is a fantastic initiative that I want to see protected from failure.

I believe local services in Division 9 could be greatly improved. Aside from increasing available weekend staff, residents want more footpaths, improved parking, upgraded roads, bridge repairs, accessible public transport options and a hard waste collection service. Council money is being spent on projects south of the River, where residents of Division 9 receive little to no direct benefit. Residents would rather see services and infrastructure improve their daily lives.

In addition to the issues raised by Mr Dredge, I stand for open meetings, transparency and making information accessible, a focus on encouraging industries that provide secure, well paid jobs with career opportunities to set up shop here on the Sunshine Coast, and vastly improved community consultation processes. In my opinion, the community needs to be placed much higher on the list of council's priorities.

MILK CONTRACT

In a rush to milk political points, the LNP's Deb Frecklington is determined to bring 140 Queensland dairy families to the brink of ruin including up to 20 farms on the Sunshine Coast and Gympie.

Mrs Frecklington's reckless demands to tear up a new, independently awarded contract with Brisbane-based Pauls to supply dairy products to Metro North hospitals demonstrates she isn't fit to lead Queensland.

In her haste for a headline, Deb Frecklington conveniently forgets the LNP signed off on Metro North's first Pauls contract while she was Premier Newman's apprentice.

Pauls buys milk from Queensland dairy families from the Southern Downs, to the Burnett, Central Queensland and the Atherton Tableland.

It employs 700 Queenslanders in Queensland.

Jobs are at risk of going interstate under the LNP's alternative plan to award the tender to a Sunshine Coast dairy that concedes it can't supply the volume and type of products needed by Queensland hospitals.

CHARITIES AT A LOSS

Many charities rely on 'work for the dole' staff to continue. They are desperate for volunteers, depending heavily on this conscripted workforce to adequately function.

With the advent of unprecedeted fires and ensuing smoke haze throughout the past few months, the Australian Government's 'Centrelink', in its infinite wisdom, granted work for the dole recipients two weeks time off before Christmas - in December 2019, a peak period for charities. Now this has been extended to March, 2020, to "protect" all those on 'Newstart' from any effects of smoke inhalation, regardless of what Australian state they live in, fires or not. They have only a minimal number of compulsory work hours weekly, anyway, unlike the real world.

This has left many charities short on workers, while those who volunteer willingly, face a backlog of work to continue with the impossible task of functioning as before. This is an Australia wide dilemma for managers, now on skeleton staff for three months, while work mounts up without those normally forced out of their comfort zones, to actually contribute to worthwhile activities for those less fortunate than themselves. Many charities do this good work, helping those living in poverty in developing nations, which don't have a generous welfare system like Australia.

"What's good for the goose [apparently, isn't].... good for the gander." Paid workers have no such benefits, rain, hail or shine. Those who receive taxpayer funds without contributing to Australia's prosperity are, "treated with kid gloves".

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RUFous ST CONTRACTORS GO INTO LIQUIDATION

IN A blow to a Peregian based development, Noosa Council has announced that they remain committed to delivering the \$5.2 million Rufous Street Stage 3 project, following news that the local firm contracted has gone into liquidation.

Noosa Council officers were made aware on Monday that Ri-Con Contractors Pty Ltd was placed into liquidation, with Worrells Solvency & Forensic Accountants appointed as liquidators.

Acting Director for Community Services Ashley Saward said it's deeply disappointing for the community.

"It's distressing for the workers, sub-contractors and other local businesses, and of course for the broader community who will suffer a delay to the delivery of community assets as a result.

"Ri-Con had done some great work on a number of Noosa Council community projects and this included the new Peregian Beach toilet amenities, the roof and deck works at the Noosa Aquatic Centre, Noosa Main Beach boardwalk and the recently completed car park at Pere-

gian Beach." Mr Saward said.

"Council diligently assesses all tender submissions prior to awarding contracts and where possible looks to support local businesses.

"We had a great working relationship with Ri-Con staff, so the loss of jobs in the community and the flow-on impact to subcontractors is obviously upsetting," Mr Saward said.

Ri-Con was soon to commence construction of the Community House as part of the Rufous Street Stage 3 Project, however this will now be delayed while Council takes advice on the impact of the insolvency of Ri-Con and the process to appoint a new contractor in these circumstances.

Mr Saward said the Australian Government, State Government and Council jointly fund the Rufous Street project.

"Any subcontractors to Ri-Con who have not been paid are encouraged to seek independent legal advice," Mr Saward said.

THE EARLY BIRD GETS THE ON-TIME DISCOUNT

SUNSHINE Coast rates notices have been issued and will start arriving this week. If you pay on or before Friday February 21, you'll receive council's on-time payment discount of five per cent of your general rate, up to \$100 every six months.

Sunshine Coast Council Finance Portfolio Councillor Tim Dwyer said your rates ensured council could continue to build a healthy, smart, creative region while delivering a range of services to support a strong community.

"Council funds many important services, facilities and programs through rates payments, including our libraries, our parks and gardens, our roads, environmental programs and economic initiatives, just to name a few," Cr Dwyer said.

"You can sign up to My-Council on council's website, which offers an online dashboard for property owners and rate payers to view their property, rates and pet registration details, make requests to council, update their personal information and make payments online.

"You can opt to receive future rates notices by email to ensure you receive them anywhere you are and plan ahead to never miss the on-time payment discount.

"I encourage ratepayers who are currently receiving their rates notices in the post to visit council's website, sign-up to My-Council or login to their existing My-Council account and change your preferred rates notice delivery method from post to email."

You'll find a step-by-step guide to setting up your My-

Council account and changing your preferred rates notice delivery method on council's website.

There are a range of convenient options available for paying your rates, including BPAY, by phone on 131 816, in person at Australia Post, at one of council's customer contact centres or by mail.

Council also has a direct debit option, which can be set up to pay rates in full by the due date, to make life easier for busy ratepayers. To assist with online or over-the-phone payments, property owners will

need their payment reference number, found on their rates notice.

Ratepayers who cannot make payment by the due date are encouraged to enter into an arrangement to pay their current rates by instalments by logging into MyCouncil or by contacting council.

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CAR PARKING RESPONSE

IN A STORY that we printed last week – SUAREZ CHALLENGES PARKING LOTS AT ANZ REDEVELOPMENT, we did not receive a response from Sunshine Coast Regional Council or current Division 9 Councillor Steve Robinson by the time of going to print. We have subsequently received a reply and a Sunshine Coast Council spokesperson said that as with all developmental applications, this particular one will be assessed on its

individual merits against the Sunshine Coast Planning Scheme 2014.

"In this instance, an information request has been issued to the applicant and council has requested further clarification about the existing and proposed uses on site as well as information about car parking spaces in relation to the transport and parking code section of the planning scheme," the spokesperson said.

"Once received, council will assess the applicant's response against the relevant require-

ments of the planning scheme prior to making a decision on this application."

Details on the development application can be publicly viewed on council's Development.i website

Division 9 candidate Maria Suarez is challenging the merits of a development at the former ANZ site in Coolum on the grounds that it will not provide adequate parking for the size of the development and that such parking provisions are set out in the Town Plan.

I AM writing this article with a broken wrist... and with huge gratitude to the Coolum Ambulance staff... and this has led me to reflect on the difficulties of earlier times in Coolum. Despite Coolum's idyllic beginnings, with unspoiled beaches, no traffic problems, or flight-path concerns, and few outside influences, in an era without radio, television or

mobile phones, life here was more difficult than we might imagine.

Ada Baker, who was 16 when she first came to Coolum with her parents in 1914, later reminisced that the Coolum Beach area had only four houses at that time – three old cottages, owned by Mr Thompson, near the beach, and the Perry-Keene home, where today's BP

garage now stands – and how it took two hours to carry milk and cream by cart to Coolum Creek, serviced by Coulson's boat from Yandina to Maroochydore and back three times a week. She also told how her parents carried her little sister, who was very ill, by cart to Coolum Creek, then by rowboat to Floods wharf, near Bli Bli, where they carried her through a swamp

until they were able to borrow a cart to take her to Nambour. Unsurprisingly, the child died on the way.

In the tiny Yandina cemetery, the nearest cemetery to our 'idyllic' town, I found a sad little tombstone marking the burial spot of three children from the same family – a 2-year-old boy in 1914, and two daughters – aged 4 years, and 8 months – in 1918. These were the children of Annie and Dick Mealing, who originally lived at Yandina Creek, then came to Coolum in 1919 with their only surviving child, Alma [later Alma Wintzloff] to be closer to Carl Stumer, Annie's father. Dick Mealing became well known for the sawmill which he established in Jenyor Street, cutting timber for houses, and for wooden packing cases used to send pineapples and bananas to market, but the family's later success must have been tinged by lingering sadness.

More recently, in the early 1950s, during a period of severe flooding between Coolum and Yandina, a local lady made her way to Nambour, carrying her seriously ill child. Her journey involved travelling, by car, by walking through floods, then in a farmer's small boat, and eventually in a car driven by a kindly farmer. Yet again, the child died during the mother's selfless journey.

Today we are so lucky, surrounded by services which make life easy for us in our wonderful locality... but sometimes we should stop and think of those who didn't find life in this area quite as easy as we have it!

With the click of a few buttons, it's now easy to search 70-plus council-owned locations such as parks and beaches, check real-time availability for that destination and book and pay for a Noosa ceremony location.

In response to an increase in demand for online wedding applications, Council partnered with Attekus to create the purpose-built government platform.

Property Manager Clint

Irwin said the new portal will make managing the hundreds of bookings each year, a lot easier.

"Until now, customers had to enquire first to see if a location was available before then making the booking. Customers can now check a public space and venue availability in their own time and receive faster Council approval."

"The new booking portal means wedding parties and wedding organisers can now secure and pay for their dream Noosa wedding location in just a couple of minutes."

The platform also includes images and maps for various Council-owned parks and

Weekly Weather Forecast

WE HAVE seen a continuation of hot and humid weather across the Sunshine Coast over the Australia Day long weekend and so far this week. There has been a few showers moving in from time to time with the onshore northeast winds, however rain totals have not been significant on the Sunshine Coast.

Significant rain has been falling through northern Queensland as well as through the dry central and western parts of the state. Very heavy rain totals have fallen through

areas like Mount Isa and Winton, and some flooding has resulted. Additionally, the tropical east coast (north of about Mackay) as seen some very heavy rain totals also, which is not out of the ordinary for this time of year - it is the season of monsoonal rains through the tropics.

Back on the Sunshine Coast, we will see a continuation of very warm and very humid weather for the rest of this week and over the coming weekend. Winds will generally remain from the northeast and we could

see a few showers returning later on Thursday and into Friday as some moisture returns. Very limited rain (if any) however should fall over the weekend.

The interesting weather through the tropics will continue early next week with monsoonal lows possibly developing further through the Gulf of Carpentaria and the Coral Sea. As this occurs we should see further heavy rain and thunderstorms through the north of the state. At the same time, high pressure will increase



in the Tasman Sea and this will increase the onshore east to northeast winds on the Sunshine Coast. As this occurs a very deep and moist onshore wind will develop along most of the Queensland coast, and combined with the high humidity this should lead to an increase in the shower activity from around Monday next week and this trend should continue through most of next week. The development of tropical lows further north will need to be closely monitored next week also because these may directly (or at least indirectly) have an effect on the weather further south through SE Queensland later next week.
