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## **Community to rally against virus**

ANGELA Dunbavan knows firsthand the impact COVID-19 is having on members of the community who work in the "gig-economy" people such as musicians. The independent candidate for Division 9 is the Director of 'Red Chair', one of Queensland's most successful performing arts companies, which employs arts workers at major and independent venues and festivals across the state.

"In a matter of days, I have watched the cancellation of every festival, concert and event across the country as fear of the COVID-19 spread forces event organisers to protect their patrons and workers," Ms Dunbavan said. "This is having a major

impact on our independent artists and performing arts industry with all income for the foreseeable future literally disappearing before their eyes.

Division 9 is home to a significant population who work in the "gig- economy" - individual contractors and freelancers who do not get paid if their event is cancelled and who don't have sick or holiday leave entitlements to fall back on. "Our musicians, dancers,

actors and many of those in the tourism trade have legitimate fears about their immediate future, and these professionals contribute so much to our community and we have to look at ways to support them."

Ms Dunbavan has been actively participating in industry forums and discussions to tackle the impact on the industry.

We're putting our creative minds to the task of reducing the impact on our community - everything from live streaming performances into people's living rooms, seeking short term alternative employment opportunities and lobbying government to ensure our gig economy workers are not overlooked when government stimulus packages are introduced."

Ms Dunbavan is also urging the community to look out for each other as the COVID-19 crisis unfolds.

"Please check-in on your neighbours especially the

elderly, listen to health advice about social distancing, remember that many people can't afford to stockpile groceries, so share yours with those who need them, be kind to each other and take responsibility for your health."

The Division 9 Candidate is also encouraging everyone to vote now at the Early Voting Centre at Coolum RSL.

"The Electoral Commission have advised that the local elections will go ahead and the early voting centre at Coolum RSL is open Monday to Friday until the day before the election.

"We can all help with the social distancing strategy to stop the spread of COVID-19 by voting now and avoiding the crowds on election day, Ms Dunbavan said.

Extended voting hours are also now being offered at some of the larger regional centres.

the Federal Government's action, however stated that more could be done.

"I think they have done good work but not enough of it.'

"We would have had more tele health where people can ring their doctor and get advice and have that bulk billed - its very hard to do that at the moment and we need more people being tested for the virus and we need much better advertising and public information as there is so much confusion," Mr Bowen stated.

When asked about the economic ramifications as a result of COVID - 19 Mr Bowen was very blunt, stating that saving lives was the utmost concern.

"The economy is going to be damaged either way but I'd rather do more now and save lives and we can worry about

the economy later." The QLD State Election, which will be held later in the year, was another question posed to Mr Bowen.

"Queensland has been a tough state for Labor for a long time... Anastasia has got in as the underdog the past two times and she will probably go in this time as the underdog, but she has done a great job and everywhere I go I see the good work that QLD Labor have done and I wish them all the best for later in the year."

The other special guest, Senator Chisholm addressed Labor Party members from the wider region and discussed the recently completed internal inquiry into the last federal election (of which he was an essential part), stressing that the inquiry was, "deep, dispassionate and did not pull any punches".

Mr Gissane thanked the visitors for coming to the

district and said local Labor activists were always grateful for the opportunity to communicate the needs of the Sunshine Coast region.

Other topics discussed were domestic violence, the future of fossil fuels and the impact on employment and how casual workers will be protected in the emerging economic downturn.

In closing, Mr Gissane stated that The Ninderry Branch of Queensland Labor has established a reputation as a, "Fearless voice for what really matters in our region."

"To have Mr Bowen and Senator Chisholm meet this wide cross section of members speaks volumes for their willingness to encounter how life really exists in the district and I thank them on behalf of all Sunshine Coast residents who struggle to find a way through the challenges that present themselves every day.'

QUEENSLAND voters are hitting the polls early in a move that has been welcomed by Local Government Minister Stirling Hinchliffe.

Mr Hinchliffe said the turnout at early polling stations was as expected, almost two weeks ahead of the 28 March election date.

Thank you to everyone who has taken the time to either sign the petition or provide feedback about the campaign to bust congestion in Coolum. I have received an overwhelming response from locals keen to share their views.

One of the key issues that has been raised is the need to provide the parking and drop off facilities at Coolum State School in the short term. There's no doubt that the congestion at the roundabout. is worse at school drop off and pick up times, so I will be working closely with the school and the P&C to look at flow, and help take pressure off the roundabout. I also hope to continue discussions with the incoming divisional councillors in relation to extending the local road network to the Motorway at Suncoast Beach Road, which has been on Council's agenda for many years. #### Hyman seeking to rectify drain issues at Mt Coolum

DIVISION 8 candidate Kathryn Hyman is taking to task Sunshine Coast Council in relation to the recent flooding which occurred in Mt Coolum on February 12 which resulted in 35 residents in a Tanah Street West complex forced out of their homes and the golf course losing money in closures as a result of the poorly managed drainage network in the region.

Ms Hyman stated that over the last five years the Mt Coolum golf course management has been lobbying to have the neglected drainage provisions addressed in the area.

"The golf course management have been proactive in lobbying council for many years to address this ongoing ponding of stagnating floodwaters - this is also creating a health hazard with mosquito infestations making conditions almost unbearable for golfers and residents alike - the risks associated with Ross River Fever and Dengue Fever are fully appreciated by residents." A drain was built in 1985 and was 30 metres wide to attenuate excess flood waters within the low lying drainage deficient area – it has been neglected to the point where it is now only three metres wide.

"Management of the golf course were successful in having council bring out an excavator some years ago but were told council was not allowed to go any further owing to constraints imposed by the State Government regarding protected mangroves present in the easement," Ms Hyman stated.

Ms Hyman further went on to say that there had been repeated statements by council stating that they were "hamstrung" and would simply not allow the maintenance works.

"I noted that developers push papers around and acquire permits to remove mangroves as recently as late last year at the proposed Twin Waters West site, and I also noted that residents of the sand canals in our region are instructed by council in their publication of April 2019 to systematically remove mangroves and any other marine plants as weeds without a permit."

Ms Hyman says she has made inquiries to the relevant State Government departments and their responses paint a different picture than that stated by council.

"Advice I have received from the office of the Minister of Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries states that The Department of Agriculture and Fisheries (DAF) has not prevented the Sunshine Coast Regional Council from undertaking works on the subject site and Fisheries Qld within DAF has undertaken searches to identify any recent inquiries or applications that may be relevant, and no relevant development applications currently or recently were identified," Ms Hyman said.

Ms Hyman further went on to say that the first record of council being proactive was on February 19 of this year - a week after the substantial flooding.

"Further, in certain circumstances, Local Governments can take urgent action without approvals under the Planning Act.

"For example, section 166 provided exemptions if an emergency is causing a safety concern."

"Passing this buck is not the fault of council officers – they are constrained by their budgets," Ms Hyman said.

If elected as the Division 8 Councillor Ms Hyman is seeking a review of budget cuts to these types of on the ground services in an effort to ensure such inconveniences to residents and businesses do not happen again.

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
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

THE SURFING Australia 2020 QLD Surf Festival has wrapped up for another year and thankfully all events were run before competitions and mass gatherings cancelled due to COVID – 19.

The North Shore region played host to a series of events at Coolum Main Beach before conditions turned sloppy and took the championships to other locations on the Sunshine Coast.

Locals featured in most events with the individual masters shortboard competition crowning Coolum's Bruce Dunne the over 60 men's winner. The open shortboard competition produced a tough and hard title to win with the Gold Coast's Jade Wheatley managing to just secure the win against Coolum's Ellia Smith.
