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## LIVE MUSIC RETURNS TO STAGES ACROSS AUSTRALIA



A unique brand of classical music will return to stages across Australia this year following the announcement of a \$560,000 Federal Government Grant by Federal Member for Fairfax, Ted O'Brien who made the funding grant official at a morning tea and recital last week at the Peregian Springs 'The Pool Café'. A group of talented young musicians from the Young Mannheim Symphonists, mentored by the Australian Romantic and Classical Orchestra performed for a small audience at The Pool Café last week after the funding coup was announced. The Australian Romantic and Classical Orchestra, which is managed from the Sunshine Coast, will use the massive funding boost to significantly expand their national tour in 2022 and build their education capacity. Mr O'Brien said that the funding highlighted the Federal Government's support for the arts and live music industry with nearly \$1.5 million delivered for the sector in Fairfax over the last year alone. "Musicians have been held back from doing what they love over the past two years just as audiences have been starved of the joys of live entertainment and performances," Mr O'Brien said. Coolum Meals on Wheels President Sue Green said that the organisation had a strong contingency plan in place to ensure clients and volunteers are safe.

"We have split our delivery runs and minimised the need for direct contact during delivery and only minimally reduced (no side salads for a short time) some of the wide range of food options our cli-

ents currently enjoy.

"Should the kitchen temporarily be closed these freezers guarantee continued service providing the basic three course meal and juice until the kitchen is up and running again."



### GRANTS

## A look back in time

### YAROOMBA STREET NAMES REVEALED

LAST WEEK I received a great gift – a copy of Stan Tutt's book "Caboolture Country", published in 1973, which a local resident had found in his private collection. This was important as, for the first time ever, I could put a face to the great man who named Yaroomba's streets, just over sixty years ago.

Geeribauch [known as Willie McKenzie], who came from Kilcoy Station, provided great assistance to Dr. Fred Whitehouse, an academic at the University of Queensland, by repeatedly pronouncing each indigenous word until Dr. Whitehouse could write its closest sound value for posterity, as well as assisting Dr. L.P. Winterbotham, another University of Queensland academic. Dr. Whitehouse owned one of the first homes in Yaroomba, and brought Mr. McKenzie to at least one meeting of the Yaroomba Progress Association, held in the Brisbane suburb of St. Lucia, in 1961, where [according to the Nambour Chronicle] "a choice of between 20 and 30 words was made and studied by the members of the local progress association and ... the street names were then altered to names from the

local Yinneburra tribe". However, the local tribe for this district were/are the Gubbi Gubbi people, and Geeribauch was a Dungida man from Kilcoy - a Jinibara [Yinneburra] man and the two groups spoke different languages. This led to confusion in the naming of some of our most prominent Yaroomba streets, because Dr. Whitehouse assumed that the names that Geeribauch had suggested were Gubbi Gubbi names. In the minutes of the May 1961 meeting of the Yaroomba Progress Association, [Yaroomba meaning "Surf beach"], these names were listed as ... Yinneburra – "The tribe that lived here" ... Goongilla – "Fresh water" ... Yerranya – "Look at the flowers" ... Warragah – "Surf" ... Neurum – "Sunshine" ... Waraan [now spelt Warren] – "Parrots" [This was followed by the explanation "... plenty along this road"] ... Boward – "Low bush" ... Wunnunga – "Good look-out" ... and Birrah – "Pleasant spot to rest in". These minutes state that "All [of the names] are from the language of the local Yinneburra tribe of aborigines."

A street named Woolgin Esplanade [meaning "Ocean"] was planned at this time, but appears not to have been built, as well as streets proposed

as "Gooyoom" – a camp, "Murra Murra" – someone else's camp, "Baal" – salt water, "Moondoothin" – a sand dune, "Diyalli" – tailor fish, "Whawoong" – eugarie, "Yoorlo" – porpoise, "Dallagoor" – whale, "Yuangin" – dugong, "Meerbeer" – turtle, "Yerra" – flowers, "Yina" – a stream flowing into the sea, "Goooorbeen" – the north wind, "Nyoorin" – sun or sunlight, "Nyandair" – a swamp ... and "Bingo" – a razor shell, all suggested by Dr. Whitehouse in 1960, from words shared from Geeribauch.

It would be great if local houses and/or units could share these names!

## Salty Saturdays set to transform Jack Morgan Park

COOLUM Business and Tourism is on a mission to get people to stay in town and to spend money within the local economy and one way that they are hoping to entice both visitors and locals alike to do this is with their new market – ‘Salty Saturdays’ which will be held in Jack Morgan Park on the second and fourth Saturday of each month from 2.30 -8.30pm.

Research conducted by Coolum Business and Tourism showed that the peak time in


The delay of opening until February 7 will make that opening even more vibrant and dynamic when it does arrive. With extra time, students will be even more excited to return

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

## CAUTION URGED FROM DOG OWNERS TO STOP ATTACKS

STATISTICS from Noosa Council saw a 72 per cent increase in dog attacks in the last quarter compared to the same period last year and this has promoted Noosa Council to plea for dog owners to be more responsible.

There have been 24 dog at-

tacks in the last three months, taking the total to 72 for the year, which is too many.

Acting Local Laws Manager Stephen Thomson said the latest spike is quite disturbing.

"Dog owners need to review safety obligations to keep the community safe."

"During the past few months we've seen an increase in dog attacks and in the severity of the injuries."

The number of victims requiring hospital treatment has also increased.

Recently a delivery driver was attacked while delivering a package to a home and as a result the driver spent three days in hospital after suffering a serious injury.

"We want to remind dog owners of their obligations."

"Dogs must be on lead in public areas and owners must ensure their dog cannot escape their property, especially with kids at home," Mr Thomson said.

In off leash areas, owners must still have effective control of their animals and the failure to do so may result in council taking action including warnings, fines, and in serious cases, prosecutions.

Residents are urged to check fences and gates to make sure pets can't escape or nip passers-by.

Both Noosa and Sunshine Coast Council have extensive information on their websites as to where all dog friendly beaches and parks are located.

Local Laws officers within both council jurisdictions are actively patrolling the beaches and parks over the holiday period in an effort to keep our open spaces safe to enjoy for everyone.
