IN NEWS that was handed down last week, the Supreme Court has ordered that both Sunshine Coast Council and

Sekisui House are to pay Development Watch's legal costs in the appeal against the controversial development at Yaroomba Beach.

A representative from Development Watch (DW)

attended the Supreme Court last week where a Court Order was handed down in relation to the Supreme Court Appeal by Development Watch.

The Supreme Court has

ordered Sunshine Coast Regional Council and Sekisui House Coolum Pty Ltd jointly to pay two thirds of Development Watch's Supreme Court costs.

The DW spokesperson

said that they had no idea as to how much money they would receive as a result of the ruling.

costs which will have to be assessed by a Costs Assessor in accordance with the Supreme Court Scale (not what we actually spent).

"There are still outstanding bills, and any leftover funds will be put towards the Planning and Environment Court review," the spokesperson said.

The Court also ordered that the matter be remitted back to the Planning and Environment Court so that the errors in law can be dealt with. The actual procedure once it is remitted back will be decided by the Planning and Environment Court, when this might happen is not yet known.

"The Planning and Environment Court should contact all parties and arrange a time to set down some sort of pro-

cess and timetable.

"It is in the Planning and Environment Court's hands, and we just have to wait."

A Sunshine Coast Council representative stated that as the matter was still before the courts that their response would be limited and provided the Advertiser with the following summation.

"On May 17, 2022, the Court of Appeal (COA) provided a further judgement on the Sekisui House, Development Watch and Sunshine Coast Council appeal matter. The COA determined the following:

"The matter will be remitted back to the Planning and Environment Court to be determined according to law - the Planning and Environment Court will determine which judge will hear the matter; and the Sunshine

Coast Council and Sekisui House are to pay two thirds of Development Watch's costs for the COA matter. The matter will now be returned to the Planning and Environment Court."

Sekisui House declined to offer any comment due to the matter still being before the courts and would not be commenting on any proceedings.

With another 'win' under their belt regarding the controversial development at Yaroomba, the local community groups are hopeful for further wins according to the DW spokesperson.

"DW hopes that the Planning and Environment Court get it right this time so that the matter can be put to rest, and no further Appeals will be necessary."

THERE is no denying that potholes are hard to avoid and can cause great damage, and with the recent deluge and minor flooding across our region this has prompted renewed calls for our community to do a pothole or report damaged roads.

Sunshine Coast Council crews and contractors have been busy clearing debris and assessing our roads to make sure they are safe with Sunshine Coast Council Community Portfolio Councillor David Law encouraging the community to be the eyes and

ears in locating damaged roads which have emerged after the recent weather.

"Since the February weather event and the more recent heavy rain this month, some of our roads have been significantly impacted," Cr Law said.

"We always appreciate the community's assistance in locating and alerting us to any repairs needed, especially on local residential streets.

"Before you report potholes or damages, please firstly check if the road is owned by the local council or the State Government. You can

quickly check this by visiting the Queensland Traffic Road Lookup website which tells you if you should contact council or the Department of Transport and Main Roads.

"This step before you submit your request will ensure the repair job is directed to the correct road owner to get the job done quickly."

VOLUNTEERS from the Coolum State Emergency Service (SES) recently held a “thank you” BBQ to show their gratitude for those who have helped so far throughout this very trying year. Representatives from other Rural Fire Service brigades located at Valdora, Maroochy River, Bli Bli, and Verrierdale came along as well as Coolum Subway owner Preeti Gazra, and Domino’s Coolum manager Simon Scott – all have shown unwavering support during the February rain and floods and during our latest wet weather events.

The 2022 wet weather season has been exceptional, as the region received above average rain and flood levels from Summer and into Autumn.

During the February weather event, the Coolum SES crew received more than 100 requests for assistance which meant all hands on deck for the 15 local SES

volunteers.

Coolum SES Group Leader, Brendan Jones praised those involved for lending a helping hand, including the local Subway owners who kept volunteers fuelled with food and ready to work.

“What an amazing job our emergency service volunteers have done, turning up to fill hundreds of sandbags, assisting property owners, tarping roofs, removing fallen trees from driveways, and just lending a hand where needed,” Brendan said.

Brendan stated that so far this year the Coolum SES had attended to 130 callouts/jobs.

“In comparison in 2018 we maybe attended to 24 callouts for the entire year.”

Brendan also wanted to let the community know that there was no better place to volunteer, than with the SES.

“With the SES you get transferable skills such as leaderships and how to work in a team, using initiative and how to think on your feet.

“I really cannot thank our volunteers enough – kudos to them.

“Just think about the volunteers who have to work fulltime but still go out in the middle of the night to help others- it is just amazing what they do,” Brendan said.

The SES performs a range of functions to respond to local, state, and national disasters and emergencies. Later in the year the Coolum SES will be celebrating 41 years and will be once again encouraging the community to get prepared from September for the summer storm season.

QLD Gov announces free flu vaccinations for all

WITH the start of the winter flu season already upon us all Queenslanders will be offered a free flu vaccination as the state faces a severe outbreak of Influenza A.

COVID-19 measures had reduced flu cases to almost nil since 2020 but more than 4,000 cases have already been reported in 2022 and cases in Queensland are doubling every week increasing from 1,848 to 4,282 in the past week.

Premier Anastacia Palaszczuk said she had taken the unprecedented decision to protect Queenslanders because of the three following reasons:

- *Influenza A is predominantly a virus impacting young and old age groups more than others

- *Vaccine rates and immunity levels are low

- *Case numbers are climbing faster and earlier than expected

Most importantly all of the impacts of COVID-19 including absenteeism,

interruptions to supply chains and health services will be duplicated and exacerbated by a simultaneous outbreak of Influenza A.

“We have seen how difficult it has been to fight COVID-19,” the Premier said.

“To fight COVID-19 and the flu is doubly hard and that’s why we are making these flu shots free for everyone.”

Acting Chief Health Officer Dr Peter Aitken said time is of the essence.

“Influenza A is more severe than Influenza B,” Dr Aitken said.

“It leads to greater numbers needing to go to hospital and vaccination rates for children six months to less than five years of age is just six per cent.

“I urge parents of all age groups to please take up this offer of a free vaccine.”

Health Minister Yvette D’Ath said the free vaccines will be available for

all Queenslanders aged six months and older.

“Flu vaccines are generally not free except for the most vulnerable,” the Minister said.

“Our 2017 season saw more than 750 people in intensive care and the fact that more than 4,000 cases have already been detected when flu seasons don’t usually begin until late July is very concerning.

“Our best defence is to get as many people vaccinated as possible.”

The Minister also thanked the professional pharmacy and medical bodies for backing this initiative and asked all Queenslanders to be patient and kind to the healthcare providers as this initiative is rolled out across the state.

The vaccines will be available free from GPs and pharmacies from now until the end of June.

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A look back in time

DATING YOUR LOCATION POINTS

AS I STARTED to write this article, I had a confused phone call from a friend who stated - "Near the Post Office" he said, trying to describe a building location. I suggested the Post Office which stood in Beach Road until January 1986, or the one in Wright Place on the William Street - David Low Way corner, whereas he was talking of the Birtwill Street office.

In our rapidly growing area, it is interesting to judge how long people have lived here by descriptions such as this. A 'Coolum school' might mean the Provisional School opened in 1917, the Coolum State School which stood at the corner of Warrack Street from 1930 to 1955, today's Coolum State School in School Road, or Coolum High School in Havana Road.

One phrase which helps to judge when people became members of the Coolum 'family' is the term 'D.P.I' ... if you are puzzled by this term, this article might help to explain why.

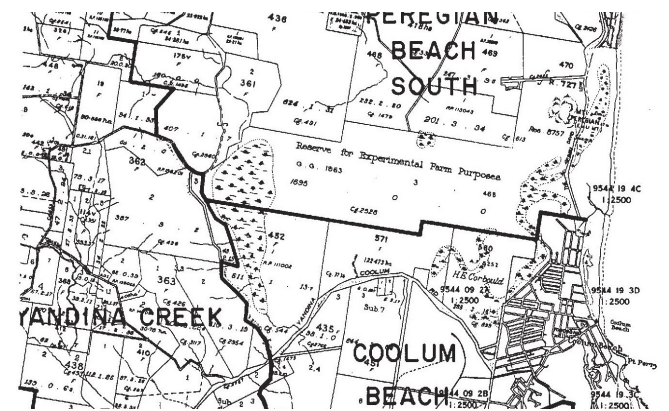
Seventy years ago, on March 31, 1952, the Queensland Minister for Agriculture and Stock wrote to Mr David Low, the Member for Cooroola, the local member for the Coolum and Nambour

areas, to tell him that an area of 1,930 acres [just over 781 hectares] had been "set aside as a reserve for experimental farm purposes, in Portions 610 and 470 in the Parish of Maroochy ... situated close to Coolum Beach". The letter explained that "departmental officers (had) recently been devoting some considerable time to an examination of the potential uses to which the many thousands of acres of 'Wallum' soils extending along the Queensland coast might be put".

The "Reserve for Experimental Farm Purposes" formed a reverse "L" shaped area, stretching up the coast from today's Stumers Creek bridge to today's Emu Mountain Road and - on the southern

side - out towards Yandina Creek. It was managed for many years by Coolum resident, Cliff Wright, the Department of Primary Industries (D.P.I.) station had instituted great advances in the treatment of coastal Queensland soils. However, by the mid-1970s, it had completed most of its research work, coincidentally at a time when the population of Coolum had grown to such an extent that other services were becoming needed. In 1975 a request was made for a police station, and in 1977 a High School was requested. Both were built on D.P.I. land - the Police Station in 1983 (later to be moved to central Coolum and later to South Coolum Road), and the High School in 1985.

The term "out at the D.P.I." is still heard in Coolum - mainly by older residents. If you hear it used, maybe you can locate this great area!

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NOOSA RESIDENTS MUST REGISTER SHORT-STAYS OR INCUR FEES

PROPERTY owners within the Noosa local government area (LGA) have until June 30 to apply for short-stay letting and home-hosted accommodation approval without incurring application fees.

With fees being set as part of Noosa council's budget deliberations, acting Environment and Sustainable Development Director, Leo Jensen, said the current fee waiver will end on June 30. Fees will apply to all applications lodged after June 30.

"The fee waiver has been in place since the new local law for short-stay accommodation took effect on February 1, and so far, we've received more than 650 applications," Mr Jensen said.

"We're reminding those owners using properties for short-stay or home-hosted accommodation to apply now if they'd like to save on the cost of the application fee."

Applications can be made

online at noosa.qld.gov.au under 'Planning and Development'.

Under Noosa's new Short-Stay Local Law, all Noosa Shire properties used for short-stay and home-hosted accommodation must be approved and be renewed annually.

Mr Jensen said property owners should check council's website for detailed information about what to provide with their applications.

"Generally, they'll need to provide a site plan showing the location of buildings and outdoor areas, plus a floorplan showing the number of people accommodated in each bedroom. The website provides examples of the sorts of simple plans required," Mr Jensen said.

Applications will need to include confirmation the property is lawful for short-stay or home hosted accommodation use, such as where existing use rights apply, a development ap-

proval exists, or the use is permitted under the Noosa Plan.

In addition to the application process, Noosa's new Local Law requires short-stay property owners to nominate a contact person to swiftly deal with problems, which can now be reported via the new 24-hour hotline - (07) 5329 6466.

The new local law introduces a code of conduct for guest behaviour and minimum safety standards for short-term-let properties to help protect guests in the absence of state government regulation.

"All of these measures are a response to calls from the local community to ensure Noosa's short-stay properties are being good neighbours and that the property owners - the majority of which live outside of the shire - are taking responsibility for dealing with problem guests."

COUNCIL'S PLANNED BURNS TO BEGIN WHEN WEATHER CLEARS

SUNSHINE Coast Council's annual planned burn season began last month, with 13 sites across the coast earmarked for treatment with two listed within the Peregrine Springs locale along Ridges Blvd Environment Reserve and Doonan Creek Environment Reserve.

Other locations listed include Alexandra Headland, Mountain Creek, Tanawha, Diamond Valley, Buderim, Caloundra, Landsborough, Little Mountain and Caloundra West will undergo planned burns before September, if conditions are suitable.

Sunshine Coast Council Environment and Liveability Portfolio Councillor Maria Suarez said council's proactive Bushfire Management Program aimed to protect our community and enhance our environment.

"Planned burns help reduce the amount of forest fuel in targeted locations before the Spring bushfire season and usually take place in the cooler months, so the fires are less intense and more manageable compared with a potential unplanned bushfire," Cr Suarez said.

"With more than 60 per cent of council's bushland relying on fire to thrive, regenerate and maintain healthy wildlife populations, periodic fire is important to the health and survival of our forests and the animals that have adapted to live in them.

"Plants include some threatened species of eucalypts, tea-trees and wattles, and the iconic and now endangered wildflower, Christmas bells.

"Residents near the nominated burn locations should keep an eye out for advance notice of activity in their

area, keep windows and doors closed when burns are planned and ensure any respiratory medications are close to hand."

Sunshine Coast Council Fire Management Officer Guy Morgan said a trained council team worked hard to plan and prepare for burns and monitored the weather closely, waiting for the right conditions.

"Low intensity, patch mosaic burning is used to reduce the impact on native animals and achieve these desired ecological outcomes," Mr Morgan said.

"This allows animals to escape through the unburnt edges and natural features such as gullies and generally leaves 25 to 60 per cent of an area unburnt, providing animals with areas for refuge.

"We also rake around the base of significant animal habitat trees and those with important cultural values to ensure these trees are protected from the fire – some are hundreds of years old – and undertake pre- and post-fire monitoring on vegetation and associated wildlife habitat.

"Again, this season, council will collaborate with other agencies such as the Queensland Fire and Emergency Services and the Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service undertaking regional fire mitigation planning, disaster management and fire operations.

"Council will also continue to work alongside the local Kabi Kabi and Jinibara First Nations peoples to share skills and knowledge relating to bushfire management."

Council is an active member of the Queensland Fire and Biodiversity Consortium.

A map of all burns scheduled for 2022 and advance notice of any upcoming burn will be placed on council's Facebook page and people can also search "Bushfire Management" on council's website.

Residents who live adjacent to the burn locations will receive a notification letter at the start of the season and signage on the surrounding streets will be in place in the days before the burn.

All burns follow conditions issued under a Queensland Fire and Emergency Services' permit to light fire.

Where a fire can't be undertaken due to inappropriate conditions for burning, it may be rescheduled for another time depending on regional priorities.

Vegetation management, including mowing and slashing forms a large part of council's bushfire mitigation program adjacent to council reserves. Slashing is not directly managed by the bushfire management team. Delays in fire break maintenance may occur during wet or very dry conditions and will be scheduled automatically when site conditions improve.

Community safety

- Any threats to life and property call 000 (triple zero)
- Any residents affected by smoke are advised to close windows and doors, utilise air-conditioning and keep respiratory medication close at hand. Seek medical advice if you are susceptible to smoke impacts

- As a precaution, road users are advised to drive to suit conditions as there is potential for smoke to reduce visibility.

Weather Update

THE rain has been relentless over the last few days with widespread 70-200mm of rain falling across the Sunshine Coast. May rainfall records are set to fall, so let's see how things unfold over the coming days.

We are all now waiting for some fine sunny weather to return, so how will things unfold?

Unfortunately, a new upper-level trough is moving through the Wide Bay/Burnett area over the next 24 hours and

as a result we are likely to see an increase in showers and maybe even a thunderstorm on the Sunshine Coast in the middle part of the week.

This upper-level trough will move offshore, however the next upper-level trough will quickly develop and move into SE Queensland later on Thursday with another increase in showers and maybe a thunderstorm moving in during Thursday.

On Thursday night a surface low pressure system will develop off the SE Queensland coast and then this system will move away to the south/southeast during Friday and over the weekend. As this occurs winds will shift to the south early Friday and then to the southwest on Saturday and this trend will continue over the weekend. Therefore, skies will clear from early Friday with dry and sunny weather returning for Friday (long overdue) and this trend will continue over the weekend and into next week.

Longer term, dry and sunny weather should continue through all of next week with

no rain from Friday for more than a week and potentially longer. With that said, we will see more winter like weather during this period with generally mild to warm daytime temperatures, but night time temperatures will tend to be slightly below average. Some winter like weather is certainly on the cards in the days ahead, so be prepared for those much cooler nights!

Unfortunately, we are likely to see a further 25-100mm of rain between now and early Friday, so hang in there until then, because fine and sunny weather eventually awaits on the other side!
