The Queensland Grom and Junior Titles are key stepping stone events in Surfing Queensland's development pathway and has seen some of the country's most successful surfers come through its ranks. AFTER months in the planning and community feedback and voting, the good news came through last week that the Sunshine Coast has officially been recognised internationally as a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve.

The Sunshine Coast region now proudly stands as an international site of excellence and an area of natural beauty – but to be biased, we already knew that, but now the rest of the world will be let in what we know and love.

Sunshine Coast Council Environment and Liveability Portfolio Councillor Maria Suarez said joining the network of UNSECO Biosphere reserves was a significant program to be part of.

"This designation supports our commitment to remain future focused and how each of us can contribute to a sustainable region as we live, work and play on the Sunshine Coast," Cr Suarez said.

for our tourism and agriculture industries as our biosphere designation could support a sustainable 'Produced on the Sunshine Coast' brand which increases the value of products and services.

"With this designation, our region has the potential to become a magnet for others from around the world who want to buy from and visit a region that focuses on sustainability."

Cr Suarez stated that the endorsement was the culmination of years of work and preparation.

"I'd like to thank the Community Reference Group and the wider community for partnering with council in this process.

Sunshine Coast Council Mayor Mark Jamieson said recognition was a truly historic moment for the Sunshine Coast.

"I am very proud to live and work in a region that has now become a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve, as we continue to celebrate people and nature," Mayor Jamieson said.

"After years in the making, this prestigious designation will help us protect and enhance our region, communities, economy and our natural environment for future generations.

"Committing to being a biosphere ensures people on the Sunshine Coast can be confident their council and their broader community respect the environment and understand their place living within it.

"A biosphere designation shows the world we are a community that wants to live in harmony with our environment, recognises the need for responsible development to cater for the people choosing to live on the Sunshine Coast while also recognising the importance of preserving our natural environment.'

Biosphere Community Reference Group (CRG) Chair Will Shrapnel said the group had informed and shaped what a biosphere designation would mean for the community through the nomination process, and the work would continue as the project now moved into the implementation phase.

"This is just the start of the journey," Mr Shrapnel said.

"As a council and a community, now we start the process of evolving and applying what it means for us to be a UNES-CO Biosphere Reserve.

"With this official designation, nothing changes overnight in terms of how we go about our daily lives, however it provides great clarity around what our future looks like as a region with sustainability as a fundamental consideration in the choices we make going forward.

"So many of us have chosen to live on the Sunshine Coast for its natural beauty and lifestyle and this designation helps us clarify how we value as a community and how council can support us in protecting and enhancing what we have now for the benefit of future

PRAISE FOR SCUH Dear editor,

On Monday 13th at roughly 10.30am I had an accident at home, knocked about quite a bit!! My wife called 000 and the paramedics were soon there to patch me up. I had a severely lacerated lower right arm and wrist plus quite a few bumps and bruises to say the least. On arrival at the SCU Hospital, I jumped the queue and was greeted by a team of doctors, nurses and support staff.

The paramedic briefed the emergency staff on my condition and then they set to work treating my injuries. No stone was left unturned in assessing the extent of these injuries. The bleeding in my forearm was the biggest problem, but the severed artery was located and stitched, stemming the blood flow.

I had CT scans, ultrasound and x-rays, a head injury assessment and who knows what else. When my condition was stabilised, I was moved from casualty to a ward, where once again the care was first class. I was told that I would be going into theatre that night, to have my wrist injury repaired. This eventually happened at 10pm and I was back in the ward just after midnight.

The treatment and care I received for the remainder of that night and for the next two days was nothing but first class. I would like to thank all of the staff members involved for their efforts. I am now recuperating at home and will return to the hospital this week for an assessment of my wrist injury and hopefully a skin graft the next day.

Once again, my thanks to those doctors, nurses and other support staff who cared for me, I had heard so many stories of the poor level of care provided at some hospitals. My experience is the complete opposite. I am just so grateful for the kindness, care and professionalism shown by all of the hospital staff involved in my care. Thank you to all!

BLI BLI BUS Dear editor.

According to Translink, the hourly 622 bus which originally travelled along David Low Way from Maroochydore through Bli Bli to the Airport and onto Tewantin, was redirected in 2013, straight over the Maroochy Bridge to the Airport. It will remain no longer in service through Bli Bli, leaving residents without an alternate bus to the 612, or direct access to the Airport.

The 612 bus is also an hourly bus, with no connection to the River Markets shopping centre. It travels straight past the Castle, to Willis Road and, from 11 July, further into the Park Lakes developments. It provides an hourly bus service for areas along David Low Way, Nambour-Connection Road from Willis Road, to Nambour or Maroochydore.

This still doesn't provide a local bus service to River Markets from communities along David Low Way. The elderly has been forgotten. There is no pathway access from the Castle across, or the bus stop opposite the new tavern site, to River Markets. There is no crossing from the Castle bus stop to safely access River Markets. The busy and dangerous roundabout exacerbates the danger to cross.

The construction of the new Bli Bli tavern has closed any access from the shops to the one bus stop along Nambour-Connection Road heading south on the 612. This approved tavern, on a very precarious corner site, will attract even more cars on a road already highly congested.

Council's approval of residential development, without considering traffic congestion on the very limited Bli Bli road network, is unconscionable and an accident waiting to happen. A second bus, such as the 622 service prior to 2013, is the solution. Translink and council are not in the real world. E. Rowe, Marcoola.

AIRPORT OPERATIONAL DESPITE SMALL DELAY

REPORTS of a sinkhole at the Sunshine Coast Airport were reported last week resulting in confusion and misunderstanding in the wider community as to what exactly happened.

General Manager Corporate Communications, Kylie Ezzy explained that a small fault was found in the pavement on the shoulder of the northern end of runway 13/31 which was identified by Sunshine Coast Airport. "Operational staff were immediately onsite assessing the area in accordance with the necessary pavement and maintenance procedures, and the failure was repaired. The area of the runway was away from where aircraft take off and land.

"A temporary runway closure was enacted in between passenger flights while repairs were completed. This resulted in no impact to passenger or emergency flights throughout the remainder of the day with all scheduled flights continuing to operate as normal."

Ms Ezzy stated that SCA wanted to alleviate confusion in the community and misinformation that was reported.

"With references made in other publications, Sunshine Coast Airport would like to clarify that while our runway was temporarily closed, this did not and would not have affected the ability for aeromedical or emergency aircraft to land."

A look back in time

A LONG TIME COOLUM RESIDENT WITH A PASSION FOR LOCAL HISTORY

FISHY BUSINESS!

WITH MY mind still on the joys of fishing in early Coolum (mentioned in my last column), I was greatly surprised when a tiny booklet, on the same topic, literally fell into my lap as I sorted my files this week.

The 23-page booklet, 15 centimetres high and 10 centimetres wide, was published by the Yandina Amateur Fishermen's Club [Y.A.F.C.] in 1950. It contained details of by-laws, meetings and membership. Five shillings for 'active male members' [equivalent to \$9 today] and two shillings and sixpence [\$4.50] for 'active lady members', and 'juveniles' per year. The book also states that visitors from distant localities and kindred societies visiting Yandina could become honorary members for up to three months.

The objects of the club were, "the protection, propagation and acclimatisation of fish, the improvement of the method of transit and the distribution of supplies, the better demonstration of the economic value of the fishes inhabiting our waters, the promotion of good fellowship amongst amateur fishermen, and the advancement of the sport of fishing."

Each competitor might fish "from a boat, wharf, bridge, shore or any other support unless otherwise specified by special conditions" and each



fish had to "be of or exceed the respective weight or length ... prescribed by the Club." Competitors in "land fishing" had to remain five yards [roughly five metres] apart, and boats could not "approach within twenty yards of each other except by mutual consent". Anglers could not use more than two lines, with no more than two hooks on each.

Was it worth it? Well - in 1920 Stan Turton reported that, "The fish were biting well like they were on New Year's Day, and when the womenfolk and Dad came down for a swim, I had bagged 42. However, I kept on until I threw my sinker in, and taking my haul to the

camp donned my togs and joined the others... By this time Phill and Bill Worthy had returned with a haul of 54, so the total for the day's catch was 117." At breakfast the next day, the group "polished off the remainder of the fish" and then went fishing again, commenting - "The fish were biting well again and by dinner time we had bagged 90." Many local people, particularly on Marcoola Beach, have seen the winter "mullet run", but the hauls listed above were in mid-summer!

Even in the 1940s and 1950s, fishing from the shore, and in Coolum Creek [in today's West Coolum area] the fishing was excellent, The Windolf family, who lived near to the Coolum Creek wharf, often made catches of 30 or more fish in a day at this time. How things have changed!

"We have now vaccinated more than 500,000 Queenslanders against the flu since starting the program. "The rollout has had an ex-

cellent response, lifting the state's flu vaccination rate by around 10 per cent, taking it to just above 33 per cent.

"But we want to protect more Queenslanders, especially those vulnerable to influenza - if you haven't yet had your vaccination, I urge you to take up our offer of a free shot, for the sake of yourself, your family, and the community."

Minister D'Ath said more than 20,000 people in Queensland had tested positive to flu so far this year, resulting in over 2,250 hospitalisations. "This is already a harsh flu season, one that is on track to mirror the 2019 season when 66,135 cases were recorded," the Minister said.

"We're only early in the season – Queensland's flu season typically peaks in August and this year Influenza A is the dominant strain.

"It's a highly contagious disease and can be life-threatening, even for young and healthy people, flu can be debilitating." The community are also

being reminded that in addition to the vaccination, people can protect themselves and others by staying home if they are infected. "Flu spreads really easily, so if you're sick, don't go to school or university, don't go to work – stay home, and be sure to wash your hands regularly and cough into a tissue." The flu vaccine is recom-

mended annually for anyone over six months of age. For more information
