AN ELEVENTH-HOUR plea is being asked of the community to ensure the future of the North Shore Football Club with the club uncertain of its future beyond 2025 due to financial constraints and a lack of members and players.

The long-standing grassroots club based in Mudjimba is calling for urgent community support as it faces a dramatic drop in player numbers and volunteers — putting its future beyond 2025 at seri-

North Shore Football Club future in doubt if community does not 'Reignite the Roar'

ous risk.

To kick things off, the club is inviting all locals, past players, families, and supporters to attend a 'Community Chat' on Wednesday May 14 at the club on Nojoor Road, Mudjimba.

Secretary Nikole Cassin said the club currently only has 72 registered players and they were unable to field teams in many junior age groups for the 2025 season.

"We're not ready to let this club go.

"We're determined to bring back the energy, joy, and community connection that grassroots football is all about — and we need the community's help to do it."

In an effort to fight for their survival the club has launched a new campaign – 'Reignite the Roar' aimed at re-engaging local families, attracting new volunteers and rebuilding the community spirit the North Shore Football Club was known for.

"We need volunteers for the committee, and we also need coaches and managers," Nikole said.

"These volunteers give

around two hours a week for training and are also on hand for game days and the committee meets once a month."

Coaches do not have to have a child playing, the only requirement is a blue card and knowledge and passion for football.

The club is also feeling very real financial pressure with money needed for lighting upgrades to the field and memberships down due to money being tight with many families.

"There's no more Fair-Play vouchers and these \$200 vouchers helped many struggling families with membership costs and that then meant that for the juniors the only out of pocket expense was for uniforms," Nikole said.

"We are cheaper than many other clubs but it's still expensive and those vouchers really did help."

FairPlay vouchers were an initiative by the state government where parents, carers or guardians could apply for a voucher valued up to \$200 for their child, which could then be used towards sporting endeavours with a registered provider. There has been

no announcement if there will be more rounds of these vouchers.

Member for Maroochydore Fiona Simpson said that she would be meeting with the club at their Community Chat on Wednesday May 14.

"The North Shore Football Club is one of the Coast's grassroots football clubs which are so important to local community and families to keep children engaged and interested in sport – these clubs are jewels in the crown of the Sunshine Coast.

"I look forward to working with club members to get more community support and advocate for the help they need."

The Community Chat will be an opportunity for the community to come together and work on a plan as to how the club can survive.

"We need numbers," Nikole said.

"Our community is amazing and very family friendly and football is such a great sport.

"It's great for social and motor skills and we really want to be able to provide opportunities, but we need help to do that." COMMUNITY CHAT DETAILS

Coolum resort invests in solar for long term energy savings

THE COOLUM at the Beach resort which takes up a large block in central Coolum has made a sizeable investment in their energy future by spending \$400,000 on a solar installation for the entire complex.

The Coolum at the Beach Body Corporate Committee approved the investment and have stated that the project is "undoubtedly the most significant strata installation in the Sunshine Coast Local Government Area."

The complex straddles one whole block from David Low Way to Sunrise Avenue and is flanked by Margaret and Hewitt St. It has 95 apart-

A presentation was given on exactly how the solar system for the resort

ments and 14 villas with 30 permanent residents and a mix of both holiday and long term rentals.

The installation was not cheap and in order to secure the purchase the Body Corporate footed half of the bill via the sinking fund and the other half was obtained via a loan from the Macquarie Bank in a move that was seen as the most equitable for past and new owners.

However, a spokesperson for the Body Corporate said that the savings would soon be seen in a just a few years.

"We have four swimming pools here and two are heated and our power bill comes in at around \$80,000 a year so we started investigating solar."

With the help of 'Zero Emissions Noosa' the group established that a large scale solar investment was the way to go.

"We voted for this at our AGM, and all voted in favour of this project and now we control our power ourselves."

At a recent afternoon celebration residents from the complex and invited members of the community were shown exactly how the system works.

"In our foyer we have a screen that shows very clearly how much energy we are using and how much we are drawing and on sunny days we are providing all of our energy and it's very easy to see... it's a very interesting piece of technology!"

The environmental aspect of solar was also a priority for the resort as well.

"This is definitely good marketing for the resort, and we live in a beautiful coastal region that we want to preserve, and we are also looking at potentially installing charging stations for electric vehicles."

The solar installation took around six weeks and was completed by early April.

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Help design and connect link between beach and Jack Morgan park in Coolum

WHAT would you like to see in Coolum between Jack Morgan Park and the beach, and specifically along the little Park St road? Council is ready to commit to making this connection better and they want to know your ideas by May 12.

The Sunshine Coast Council 'Coolum Connections' project will deliver charming streetscape improvements to strengthen the local character and heart of Coolum.

Sunshine Coast Council Division 9 Councillor Maria

Suarez said the project aimed to improve access to, and use of, important links between the foreshore and main street. through to Jack Morgan Park.

"We're looking to really connect the spaces and places our community loves, and this will include making it easier to find and access the Coolum Library and Civic Centre, located next to the park," Cr Suarez said.

"The project will build on significant planning and community engagement undertaken over the past 15

years.

"This previous planning resulted in major streetscape improvements, park upgrades and other public realm improvements."

IMPROVEMENTS TO COME

Park Street has been identified as a key priority for improvement, and Council will deliver refreshed pavement, new landscaped areas with native and coastal planting, seating nooks, improved street trees with irrigation,

and renewed street lighting with overhead festoon lights.

"As part of the improvements, the new concrete pavement will be etched with a distinctive Coolum pattern and we are seeking your input on the artwork style," Cr Suarez said.

"We'll also be adding shade trees in Jack Morgan Park, and new wayfinding and directional signage."

HOW YOU CAN GET INVOLVED

"We're inviting our com-

munity to review and provide feedback on the Draft Coolum Connections Ideas Plan and the Park Street Streetscape Refresh before May 12," Cr Suarez said.

"We look forward to your feedback on this exciting project to enhance Coolum's heart and character."

NEXT STEPS

Feedback received will help finalise the Draft Coolum Connections Ideas Plan and the Park Street Streetscape Refresh design, ready for construction. Construction is proposed for July 2025, with a project budget of \$400,000 as part of Council's Capital Works Program and Minor Capital Works Program.

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

ELDER ABUSE

THE WORST thing about the increasing prevalence of elder abuse in our society is that the great majority of it is perpetrated by the loved ones of those at the receiving end.

As the oldest members of our community enter their later stages of life, there is no doubt that they can be more vulnerable to manipulation, coercion and exploitation both financial and emotional. With the Baby Boomer generation far wealthier on average than their successors, rising living costs, unaffordable property and mortgage stress have made the temptation for their children to dip into mum and dad's estate considerable. This is especially so if the abuser is unlikely to get caught!

We routinely recommend appointing more than one child as financial enduring power of attorney, so they can 'keep an eye on each other'. Appointing another person again as executor in your will can increase the chance of discrepancies in the banking being picked up and reduce the chance of it happening in the first place.

But it's not just about steal-

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ing money. We definitely meet wills clients from time to time3 who appear to have been coached to request a particular redraft or amendment to 'even things up' amongst the kids/ Often when the change appears to do no such thing. Money or assets will often have been gifted before death to a child who is taking the carer role. The beneficiary will justify this as an 'early inheritance' but will still take their allotted share of estate

proceeds. Of course, a lot of the things that add up to financial elder abuse are illegal, and there are various ways which abusers can be brought to justice. Being replaced as **Enduring Power of Attorney** is an obvious one, being prosecuted by the Public Guardian or Police is another.

But perhaps the most satisfactory remedy for honest family members is the ability to apply to QCAT or the Court for orders that an attorney is to compensate the older person, or their estate, for loss which results from a failure to comply with the duties of an attorney under the Act.



A look back in time

FRANCES WINDOLF A LONG TIME COOLUM RESIDENT WITH A PASSION FOR LOCAL HISTORY

THE STUMERS STORY

ONE OF the best-known places in the Coolum area is Stumers Creek – where the waterway which bears this name has been much-discussed in recent times, particularly because it is loved by many people enjoying the freedom that it allows adults, children and dogs. It is a place of recreation and joy ... but also a place with an interesting history.

Wlhelm Carl [known as Carl] Stumer and his family lived in the Mount Walker/Rosewood area when Fred was born in 1890, and that is where Fred's mother died when he was ten years old. He had a younger brother, August, and two older sisters, Rebecca Berry and Annie Mealing, some of Coolum's earliest residents.

Carl briefly moved on to the Goodnight Scrub near Gin Gin and then to the Butterfat area, seven miles inland from Coolum, and Fred often

the Meadowlands area, just inland of today's Stumers Creek bridge, where the Stumer and Berry families grew bananas from February 1906.

The families moved to today's Centenary Heights area in 1910, after Carl, Fred and August sold parts of the Meadowlands property. In 1913, some visitors commented that "Mr. Stumer has a portion of his property cut up into allotments, many of which have already been secured by admirers of this fine resort". At that time the waterway which runs inland from the beach and around today's Coolum Central area did not exist – it was dug by local farmers many years later.

One advantage of the move by the Stumer and Berry families to an area they leased on today's Centenary Heights [which was not named Centenary Heights until the 1950s] was that it was closer to Coolum Creek wharf, therefore providing the Stumer family an easier route for local bananas and other produce to go to market. However, the Stumer family had fingers in many other pies. Before World War 1, seventeenyear-old Fred Stumer worked ably with Surveyor Robert Abbott, who named Stumers Creek after his hard-working assistant surveyor.

Fred Stumer never married, and lived alone for many years on, "a small allotment near Coolum Beach", where he "earned a living cutting cane and taking any work offering in off seasons". Fred was said

to be "most efficient in the art of splitting slabs and shaping roofing shingles. He was an active member of the Lifesavers, and the Coolum Rifle Club. His father died in 1937, and his brother, August, also predeceased him.

Surprisingly, many Coolum people remembered Fred Stumer as a dancer! In the early days, when fund-raising dances were a much-loved activity, it was said that "his true love was old-time dancing, at which he excelled" ... He loved dogs,

Happy Gardening

GOLDEN PENDA TREE

Everyone must have noticed the yellow trees and shrubs that are making a stunning display in our gardens and streets at the moment. It's the Golden Penda (Xanthostemon chrysanthus) an Australian Native rainforest tree, prized for its golden flowers and lovely glossy green leaves. What an absolute winner because it's a fast grower, it's useful as a wind break and will cope with either wet or dry conditions. It's not invasive so it's fine to plant in suburbia, making it an excellent screen plant. Birds such as the lorikeets and honey eaters, also bees and other insects simply love it, being attracted to the profusive nectar.

In its natural environment, the Golden Penda can grow up to 12 to 15 metres, but in a domestic situation, a little less.

A smaller version has been developed – 'Little Goldie' (Xanthostemon) and it's perfect for the home garden. It will grow to approximately two meters and is a good way to attract the wildlife into your space.

There's also another charming pink plant called Pink Penda (Xanthostemon Verrdugonianus), a little beauty.

When Brisbane held the

World Expo in 1988, the Golden Penda was celebrated as the Expo's floral emblem. Hundreds of trees were planted along the streets, and in the parks etc, making a striking golden spectacle. It was called Expo Gold

It seems that the Golden Penda is fairly free of pests and diseases.

It's not too late to give your citrus trees a bit of extra care. Clean out any weeds and apply some suitable citrus fertiliser, it's better to use a reliable brand as it will balance the nutrients for a healthy tree and a good crop. Water in well and apply mulch, keeping well away from the trunk of the tree. Citrus have a few enemies, namely the citrus spined bug and the orange citrus bug that will squirt out a nasty spray when attacked. Ask your local nursery for advice about the best treatment to be rid these nasty critters.

But in meantime, enjoy this lovely Autumn weather.

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

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
